After the 26 boards, the Swedish pair Tommy Gullberg and Madelaine Svanstrom won the first session. They got 64.16%.

The dutch Jan Tesselaar and Jan de Winter were second with 61.60%.

59.15% is what Marinella Canesi and Franco Cedolin made. They were third.

The best Portuguese were Billie Antunes and Isabel Correia. They got 4<sup>th</sup> place with 58.82%.

There are 15 pairs within 10% of the winner, so, nothing is clear, for now.

The discussion on bulletin 0 about a 9 card major suit was by no way a preview of yesterday's board 14. These hands, we are told, are randomly dealt by computer, but I'm sure the TD's had a nice laugh when a 9 card solid major suit came out.

And well?...

Did you read bulletin 0? And did you discuss with your partner how to treat these hands?

From the board results I can see most of you have. Only 11 out of 26 pairs managed to "buy" the contract at 4 or 5♠. 12 pairs successfully played in hearts (ranging from 4♥ undoubled to 6♥ doubled). Only 2 pairs finished in 6♣, both of them doubled, sharing 49 out of 50 matchpoints each, but there are 3 pairs

playing 6♥ doubled in EW, so, I'm guessing at least 2 more NS got to this excellent slam, but EW managed to get 26 matchpoints by bidding on.

So, what happened at my table? Did I pass with 9 solid hearts in first seat? Well, no I didn't. This time the suit is hearts and not spades so I opted to try and get the spades out of the auction by quickly pre-empting. This is how it went:

(\*\*) By not giving partner a chance to double 4♠ I was trying to get the message out that I had no defensive values whatsoever. So, since I opened 4♣ and not 4♥ I should have solid hearts, and probably 9 of them (I'm at the 5 level by my own)

The only problem was that my partner somehow thought that a Namyats opening bid always promised, besides a semi-solid suit, an outside Ace. And no, I did not lead my singleton club.

Not even my partner reads my articles!

I bet nobody did! The people that got it right only did because they knew what they were doing, not because they got help from some article.

Being a bridge writer is such a lonely hobby...



## CRISS-CROSSING

António Palma is a young Portuguese player but already has some international experience, both at Junior and open level. He is now rendered by some (including himself) as one of Portugal's top players. He showed good technique on board 15 yesterday.

Already on a good spot (playing 2♠) he still aimed for the maximum. West started with ♣A and K and gave his partner a club ruff. East now tried to cash the ♥A. Can you still make 10 tricks? He did. He just proceeded to cash his spades and the ♣Q arriving at this end position:

Now when he cashes his penultimate spade, discarding a diamond from dummy what does East do? If he holds on to his 3 diamonds declarer just goes to the table with a diamond, ruffs the ♥J good and enjoys it coming in with the second diamond. If East lets go of a diamond declarer simply cashes the ♦A and K, roughs a Heart back to hand and is left with the now good ♦8. A nice Criss-cross trump squeeze! You may notice that East might have beaten it by returning a Diamond after roughing the Club, but would you?
