The warmup session was won by the Norwegian pair Grethe Tecksum and Bjorn Dufseth they made 67.73%.

The Austrian pair Susanne Zach and Maximilian Buchmayr were

second, just 0.88% behind.

The German couple Helmi and Wilhelm Gromöller were third 0.88% (again) behind the Austrians.

The first Portuguese pair were the local Macedo brothers. Bruno and Pedro were 6^{th} with 60.40%.

Today we start our Pairs' Tournament. If we consider that we had 89 pairs in the warm-up, it's going to be big - another record, maybe?

Warm-Up Pairs



After a long journey starting early in the morning from Vaupillon, I arrived in Funchal early evening slightly tired to find a very pleasant temperature 20+Centigrade. I checked in to the Vidamar Resorts Hotel and then found the organizing team. Starting at 9.30 p.m. was the 'Warm-Up Pairs'. It is probably fair to say that a significant minority warmed up in the bar beforehand.

I found a vacant chair and found myself sat behind a N/S pair who were Dutch, Allie Hoenstok and Hans Metselaar, who were playing a complicated system, I must confess it confused me a little as most of the explanations were given in Dutch as frequently their opponents were also Dutch. Both I and I were forcing and had relay responses and the opening INT was a three-suited hand! They finished 36 with 51.85% and whilst they were not blameless they can count themselves unlucky on a few deals.

An early board showed the importance of discarding correctly.

Board 5. Dealer North. N/S Vul.




I gleaned from the explanations that the I^{\heartsuit} response showed I4+ points and the I \spadesuit rebid a I4-I6 no-trump hand.

The lead was the ♠3 (third and fifth) to the king and ace. Declarer now cashed five rounds of clubs and put West to the test. He discarded one diamond and three spades so now when declarer tried to make his contract by cashing the ace and king of hearts and hoping the queen dropped. He now disconsolately exited with a heart hoping for some miracle. In fact it was a double miracle as not only was West thrown in to give a trick to the diamond king but also declarer now had the thirteenth heart to cash for +1 and 75% instead of 25% for one down. Surprisingly twelve of the twenty pairs who played 3NT were successful.

The next board of interest was the grand slam, though only two pairs bid it whilst three pairs did not even manage to bid game, in fact the eventual winners Grethe Teksum and Bjorn Dufseth had a complete top when their opponents stopped in 24 and made +1!


Board 19. Dealer South. E/W Vul.



When you look at the cards it is obvious that the grand slam is there trivially with any reasonable split in the majors. Bidding-wise it can be more difficult for natural five-card systems after West opens I., unless East has an arrow in his quiver to describe his hand accurately he may be forced to respond INT and then the auction could easily become muddied. One third of the field failed to make it even to a small slam. Amusingly you can also make the grand slam in spades or no-trumps and the play is even easier than the heart contract as the only way to make the slam is to find South with Kx in spades and if you had reached the wrong slam it would have been your lucky day. Allie and Hans scored 70% when their opponents rested in game.

The following deal is instructional on suit management. At the table I was watching it was as follows:

Board 28. Dealer West. N/S Vul.



I believe the explanations are that the I♠ response was I2-I4, the INT rebid a I4-I6 no-trump and surprisingly 2♣ was Stayman.

The lead of the \heartsuit 3 (third and fifth) was covered by West's jack and taken with the ace. Declarer then cashed the \clubsuit A and when both opponents followed he could guarantee four tricks in the suit by leading towards the jack, this caters for a 4-I split in either hand. If East is the culprit then whether he takes his queen immediately or later declarer has four club tricks. If West is the culprit then he will take the jack with his queen but his ten can now be finessed against and yet again declarer has four club tricks. At my table declarer 'sensed' the club queen was doubleton and played another top club and when the split was revealed he then took every wrong view and failed by one trick for a poor result. As the cards lie, on a small heart lead declarer can make twelve tricks, but that is a double-dummy exercise but making +2 should be the normal result.

Are you awake?

After a pretty uneventful auction, you arrive to the normal contract of 6♥.

Twelve easy tricks - 6 Hearts, 4 Spades and 2 Diamonds. And, for once, your opponents don't have two cashing tricks against your slam. Finally we managed to keep our partner from steering us to the wrong contract!

But wait! West has led a diamond. Now if Hearts aren't 2-2 or Spades 3-3 you don't have an entry to cash the fourth Spade (you may get ruffed with the outstanding trump if you try to cash the spades before crossing to the ♥K). Crappy partner... As usual led us to the wrong contract! Couldn't he have bid 6NT! I'm quite sure we bid NT before he did, and if not, I'm sure he could have bid in a way we would. And here we are. Fixed by our nemesis (partner) again, and having to deal with it. How will we play it?

This board was played in last years' Portuguese Championship Quarter Finals. I was sitting South, got a Diamond lead and (mis)played it like this.

After taking the •A, I cashed Ace and Queen of trumps. Of course trumps were 3-1. Trying not to look upset about it, I followed with the King and Queen of Spades from hand. This allowed me to get the feel of the Spades - maybe the opponents would give count thinking the other one held the ace. Anyway, you can call it table presence, or, as I do, blind luck, but the fact was I ended up cashing the Ace of Spades and making the contract when Spades were 3-3.

You may say: "Wait - but you played for a 3-3 break instead of a finesse?". Yes, but I thought at the time that, after cashing 2 rounds of spades, the chances of spades being 3-3 or 4 cards in the hand that holds 3 trumps would be greater than 50% (club finesse). I checked it later - amazingly I was right, even when taking into account the void spaces difference between the hand with 3 trumps and the one with one.

But are you awake? Have you noticed where I misplayed the deal?

António Palma has been a regular presence on our Tournament having impressively won twice the Teams and once the Pairs (reigning champion).

He also declared $6 \checkmark$ at another table (I see his partners are as bad as mine). He also got a diamond lead, but played it much better. After cashing two rounds of trumps and two rounds of Spades, he just crossed to the \checkmark K and discarded the \spadesuit Q (!) on the \spadesuit K. Now he could cash the \spadesuit J discarding a club - if spades behaved he had 12 tricks - if not he would be in dummy and could lead up to the \clubsuit K.

He actually found a way to have his cake and eat it too!
