Gitte Hecht-Johansen and Szczepan Smoczynski are second overall, 1.77% behind the dutch.

The German pair Flora Zarkesch and Robert Boedeker are now third overall, just 0.28% behind the Danish-Polish pair in second place.

The second session was won by Lone Bilde and Bo Bilde. They got 70.18%.

Virginia Chediak and her father Gustavo are from Uruguay and have been coming here for many years. They made 65.52%, the second best result yesterday.

The Icelandic pair Sveinn Eiriksson and Throstur Ingimarsson, who are also long-time friends, were third with 61.85% on the session.

There are 15 pairs within 5% of the leaders. Every little thing can make a difference. There will be fight until the end.

Pairs 2

Firstly I would like to apologise for the error that appeared in my article yesterday, obviously the fault was not of my doing - the culprit has had all his No-trump cards removed from his bidding box as an appropriate punishment. In some early versions of Bulletin 2 the hand diagram had North and South had the same club suit. The Bulletin was reprinted and copies are still available outside the playing area, if you cannot find a copy we could reprint another if you need it.

Onto yesterday's bridge. I decided to watch a few hands behind Miguel Teixeira-Chairman of the tournament. Eiriksson and Ingimarsson from Iceland were the first pair to arrive.

West showed five hearts and a hand of 16+ points whilst East's 2♦ showed a balanced 9+.

With East as declarer he avoided the more testing lead of a spade when South started with the nine of clubs taken by declarer in hand with the queen. A small diamond to the ten held the next trick. Declarer fell from grace when he took the heart finesse into the South hand. This restricted him to twelve tricks and 56 of the 154 matchpoints available. Four pairs managed to bid the small slam, a 'good' slam according to Hamman but I make the odds somewhere in the teens. There was also one result I am at a loss to describe how it might have happened, viz. 3NT down two.

South found a good lead of the eight of clubs to partner's jack who continued with the seven to dummy's ace. Declarer now essayed the heart finesse which lost to the king, a club continuation allowed North to cash two club winners whilst dummy discarded a small diamond and heart and South disembarassed himself of a diamond. North exited with his remaining heart which declarer took with his ace. A successful finesse in the spade suit followed. Declarer was now at the crossroads, a diamond towards his king would certainly bring home the contract if the ace was well-placed, however declarer tried the effect of ace and another spade and when North played his ten under the ace South was able to cash two spades and give partner his diamond ace for one down for 128 - 26.

In spite of these two good boards the chairman did not have as good a session as yesterday but is lying in 25th position with an excess of 55%.

Misplay a Hand with Me

Board no. 3, Session II of the Open Pairs, I was sitting South with:

On first hand, green v. red, I decided not to open a weak two in spades in view of my heart holding:

West kicked off with the ♥Q, denying the King:

Obviously we missed a cold game. Another reason to save some points by making an extra overtrick. I won ♥A and immediately played a diamond from hand. Somewhat naively I was hoping that when West followed low, ♦K could win the trick so that I could pitch my other diamond on the second club. Not so. West hopped up with the Ace and played back ♦Q to the King. I ruffed the third diamond and played the ♠Q covered by the King, duly losing a spade, a heart and a diamond for an average score. This was the full lay-out:

Another fine misplay, because making eleven tricks wasn't that difficult. I just should have counted HCP's more properly. I should have realized that for his 1NT opener West had all outstanding points (except ♥K). So at trick two I just finesse ♣J and then advance ♠Q. After that I would be able to pitch both my diamond losers on the high clubs.


The Big Freeze

My busy schedule only allowed me to watch a handful of deals from the second session of the Pairs, but I was not unlucky in my choice.

The first EW pair to arrive were from Iceland, which gave me the germ of an idea for a title.

NS took all the space away, and with no room to manoeuvre East went quietly, only to find his partner had golden cards.


Losing 480 gave NS 79-75 - only four pairs reaching 6♠.

As an aside, you might like to consider the best line in 6♠ on a diamond lead.

I would suggest that you ruff and play a spade to the queen. If the ten falls, you can reverse the dummy, ruffing all four diamonds, arriving at twelve tricks regardless of the location of the club honours.

Next to arrive were two young ladies from Russia - I was sure I was on to something now.

South led the king of diamonds and declarer won with the ace.

The smart move now would be to play off three rounds of clubs, eliminating the suit, before playing a trump (it is rarely wrong to do this) but declarer played a spade immediately, North taking the queen with the king and returning the eight of diamonds. South won, cashed a third diamond and paused for thought.

I was expecting him to cash the ace of spades and exit with a club (it is barely possible that North started with ♠KJ when the winning defence is to play the thirteenth diamond - but with that holding I would bet my life savings that this particular North would have returned the ten of diamonds at trick three) but he played the jack of clubs immediately.

Declarer won in hand, crossed to the king of clubs and ruffed a club.


Exiting with a spade would have caused South to regret his failure to disembarass himself of the ace of spades, but declarer made the unfortunate choice of trying a heart to the nine and was one down, -100.

That gave NS 138-16, whereas losing 140 would have resulted in 53-101.

When the third pair arrived I was hopeful - could they be from Alaska or some other icy country?

Alas, they had a distinct German accent, but the bridge gods offered some remarkable compensation:

North led the king of diamonds and declarer won and treated the defenders to seven rounds of clubs.

North, in a lot of trouble eventually parted with three spades, but declarer played the queen from her hand and finished with only ten tricks, when she had a shot at twelve by playing the eight.

That would have got her up to eleven tricks, and she could have cashed the queen of spades, squeezing North who, forced to keep two hearts, could be thrown in to lead into the heart tenace.

-430 was worth 90-64.

However, that is not the main point of interest.

Suppose EW reach 6♣?

Tacchi asked me how it could be made on a diamond lead and I pointed out to him that the spade suit is frozen - whichever side leads it first will surrender a trick.

Keeping that in mind suppose declarer wins the opening lead, cashes the ace of hearts, ruffs a heart and cashes seven rounds of clubs.

North must keep two spades and so must South (discarding one allows declarer to play the queen, pinning the jack). All declarer has to do is exit with a diamond and whoever wins will be forced to lead a spade. +920 would have collected 8-146.

(There are other ways to make 6♣, but you will understand from my title why I prefer this line!)

Sidney Lazard 1930 - 2015

One of the first gentlemen of bridge died yesterday at his home in Dallas, Texas. It would take far more space than we have available to describe the many facets of this outstanding figure, who won national and international championships over six decades.

Ron Tacchi & I have fond memories of Sydney, who we met at the Orbis Bermuda Bowl in Bermuda in 2000, where he was the Captain of the winning USA team.

During that event, he also won the Limerick competition with the following stellar entry:

There was a young girl from Bermuda
 Who was wooed by a dude from Barbuda
 Till she trumped his ace twice
 And abided no vice
 The dude who had wooed her eschewed her

As an illustration of his talents at the table here is one of the most famous hands in bridge. Join Sydney in the South seat:

With neither side vulnerable, the player on your right opens 1♣ and you have the following:


♠ A 3
 ♥ 8
 ♦ A K 9 2
 ♣ A K 9 8 3 2

You pass and the auction continues like this:

When East passed it was clear to Sydney that he had psyched. When the heart fit came to light he concluded that his partner must have some length in diamonds and bid what he hoped would have some play - 6♦!


This was the full deal:

West kicked off with the ace and king of hearts and declarer ruffed with the ace of diamonds!

He continued with the king of diamonds and a diamond to the queen and advanced the jack of clubs, covered by the queen and ace, West pitching the seven of hearts.

Declarer cashed three more diamonds, pitching clubs from his hand, played a club to the eight and cashed the king of clubs to arrive at this position:

When declarer ruffed the nine of clubs with dummy's last trump West was caught in the crossfire. When he parted with the jack of spades declarer took the last two tricks with the ace and three of spades.

Not a bad hand to be remembered by - a transcendental inferential anti-psyhic coup!
