The Open Pairs Champions Are....

The results from the Open Pairs Championships came down to the wire with local favourite **Carlos Luiz** and his partner **Nuno Paz** holding off a strong challenge from **Maris Purgailis & Janis Romanovskis** who hail from Latvia by less than 0.20%. This second-placed pair had a massive third session with 67.23% and rose from seventh position at the end of the previous day. Climbing from fourteenth place to reach the third spot was the Portuguese pairing of **Antonio Campos Palma & João Vide Barbosa**.

SATURDAY LUNCH and SUNDAY GALA DINNER

We have been told by the Regional Health Authority that since these social events will include more than 100 people, everyone who attends will need a negative Covid test issued within the previous 48 hours (even if they have an EU Vaccination Certificate).

To ease the situation for the players in this festival we have managed to arrange the testing to be available in the Hotel VidaMar on Saturday – this will be in DESERTAS 2 (Level 4, Tower 1) from 08.30 till 12.00. You must have your Passport or National ID Card and Bridgmate badge to get tested.

In order to avoid a delayed start to the Teams session at 11.00, we ask that you present yourselves at the testing point as early as possible: obviously if everyone arrives at the last minute then the testing staff will not be able to process them in time for the start of play.

If you wish to be tested elsewhere (a pharmacy etc.) then you will additionally need to give the testing site a code: 100760. Please remember to bring the printed results certificate to show when entering the restaurant for lunch or Gala Dinner.

If you do not wish to be tested, and hence will not be attending the lunch and/or dinner, please inform the Welcome Desk, or the Bulletin Room if the Welcome Desk is closed (see new hours in Bulletin).

We are truly sorry that this unexpected requirement has been imposed on us at such short notice; unfortunately we are still living through the pandemic and must take every precaution to ensure people's safety. 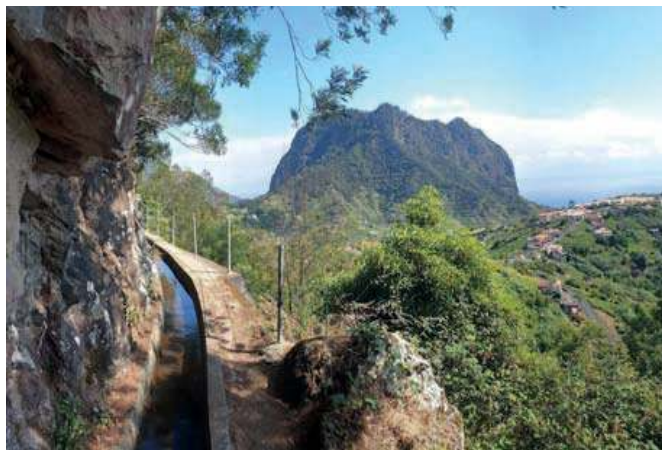
Option A: The East (full day, lunch included)
coach leaves hotel 09.30



The coach leaves the hotel at 9:30 for the drive up to Pico do Areeiro, Madeira's third-highest peak (1818m), from which you may enjoy the breathtaking views. From the mountain head down to Ribeiro Frio to admire the famous laurisilva forest (UNESCO World Heritage site), with an optional short levada walk to the Balcões viewpoint (level, easy, ≈ 30 minutes).

The next stop is Santana, with its traditional thatched houses and its vineyards. After lunch at the Quinta do Furão, drive to Ponta de São Lourenço, the far eastern headland, which boasts a wonderful combination of volcanic rocks, blue sea and nature. You will have time to take photographs before heading back to the hotel.

Option B: Levada Walk (½ day, lunch included)
coach leaves hotel 09.45



The coach leaves the hotel at 9.45 for a relaxing, easy 7km half-day walk along one of Madeira's famed levadas.

The walk starts at Referta, on the north-eastern side of the island, and leads walkers on an exploration of some of the native fauna and flora of Madeira and its abundant and varied fruit trees. In the first part of the walk, you will be able to admire the imposing volcanic outcrop of Penha de Águia and enjoy the agricultural terraces cultivated by local residents.

Lunch at the Quinta do Furão before returning to the hotel.

Please bring good walking shoes or boots, a warm coat (in case of low temperatures in the mountains) and a bottle of water. Grade: easy; Distance: 7 km; Duration: approximately 2¾ hours.

East led the ♥A and continued with the queen, West ruffing and returning a spade. East took the ace, and tried the ♥J but when West could not ruff that was +110 and 147/7.

South's cunning tactical move paid off as E/W missed their spade fit. Had he supported hearts it would have been clear to East that her partner had spades.

The defenders collected two spades, a diamond and a heart, +110 and 105/68. Pairs who reached 4♠ collected 38/116.

Leading against 3NT when you have most of your side's strength is difficult. Knowing that declarer does not have a four-card major might make you lean towards a major suit rather than North's actual choice of the ♣7 which saw declarer cash her tricks for +600 and a massive 20/134.

Defeating 3NT would have been 109/45.

East led the ♥7 and declarer won with the king and played a spade for the jack and king, West exiting with the ♣Q. Declarer ducked, took the next club with dummy's ace and played a spade to the queen. When East discarded declarer cashed two heart and played a diamond, eventually scoring the last trick with a spade, -100 and 88/66.

The leaders had made a terrific start with only one below average result. A home win was on the cards!



Running Like Clockwork

“What’s it going to be then?” I queried the smooth-running bulletin team early on Wednesday. The plan was to deploy our forces to maximise copy and still be finished in time to catch the bus for the evening’s entertainment at O Lagar. The strategy of our efforts was optimised so that two would be dispatched to view at the table whilst I would remain in our office poised to insert their pearls of wisdom into the bulletin. And then in the cool and calm of the following morn I would examine the frequencies and make a report in a more generalised manner on the Open Pairs second session. So here we are, fresh from the festivities of the previous evening and in rude health and only mildly tired, ready to scour the reams of numbers to find morsels of interest.

The first thing I noticed was there was only one slam available.

Six pairs reached Six Spades, three made it trivially after the lead of the ace of diamonds when the trump king was onside. The other three failed. To make the contract requires careful timing. I suspect it also depends what happened in the bidding – did it intimate that there might be bad breaks? If so then you have been forewarned. Let us assume the contract is played by West and the lead is the singleton club, which will be won in dummy. It seems normal to attack trumps. If South covers the trump queen then if you wish to draw trumps the third round must be taken in dummy. You then need to read North’s lead as a singleton and also get a count on the heart

suit. When North eventually comes down to four hearts you throw him in with the fourth round to give you a trick in diamonds. There are many lines of play that succeed but they are not at all

obvious unless you have a very good idea as to the actual distribution. They make for interesting perusal should you wish to exercise your copy of Deep Finesse.

There were no more slams, not even for ready money, though on this hand eleven pairs managed to bid a slam and made twelve or more tricks.

One pair even made it after the lead of the ace of hearts – I suspect that pairing will be spending some time on their signalling methods. Ten



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other pairs reached a slam, six in clubs, one in spades, one in 7NT and two more in 6NT. This last contract gave what I thought was the strangest result in that it was one off after the lead of the ♥Q. The defence must have cashed a second heart, or declarer would cash twelve tricks, so logically hearts must have been continued. Why was it not two off? As I see it there is one solution to the problem (if I am wrong perhaps the pair will come and tell what really happened): when the ♥J appeared in dummy the lead of the queen could be read as from KQ and to make absolutely sure of beating the contract East rose with the ace and returned the suit. The difference between the best and worst score on this hand was 1520. It got me thinking as to whether this was one of the biggest. Inspection soon proved otherwise. The best score by N/S was 1100 and the worst -1700 and this deal gave rise to the greatest difference: 2200.

Part of the joy at looking at some of these scores is trying to find a sensible reason for the debacle.

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On this hand one pair reached Three Clubs doubled and it was not East-West. The most likely version that I can come up with is that North opened One Club, East passed and South then ventured One Spade. Then after some takeout doubles South retreated to partner's opening suit and a red card was found. It does not take exceptional defence to hold declarer to four

tricks, although allowing six tricks would still have been an outright top.

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Another Three Clubs doubled this time by East-West and I must confess on this occasion I am a little lost as to how the final contract came about. My suspicion is that South opened his hand and at a later date made some form of negative double which was misconstrued. This may have even been an unusual variant of the Biltcliffe coup, where Three Clubs could have been passed out but the Double transformed it into a game contract. Two overtricks netted the unusual score of 1070. There were two other large scores of 800, one of which could have been 1100. The contract of 1NT doubled by South could have been held to two aces. The other was Three Diamonds doubled which also failed by four tricks.

There were other odd scores, some so odd that they defied any attempt at explanation.



Open Pairs Session 3

What would you lead from the West hand against 3NT? One has several options to consider, a passive diamond or spade lead is best. However West decided on the devastating lead of the 4♣ - devastating for the defence that is! This hands the contract on a plate to declarer and a humungously good score for North-South.

West found the lead of the ♥5 which declarer won, not unsurprisingly, with the king.

Now let us look at this hand a bit more closely. 3NT looks like a lost cause, as on the surface it looks as though you must lose four hearts and the ♦A.

But..... if declarer cashes four rounds of clubs straight away, West has to find three discards which will make him squirm uncomfortably. He can throw two small diamonds easily enough but the third discard is a killer for him. If he throws a spade declarer's spades are set up, if he throws a heart, he reduces his heart winners to three and the contract is home.

At the table, declarer tested the spades first and now it is too late, as West can safely discard a heart and will win one diamond, three hearts and a spade.

I enjoyed watching the rest of the



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boards – North-South played accurately and steadily throughout. It was a pleasure to see successful young players at the bridge table and I suspect we will have to watch out for them for many years to come.
