The girl that hits The New York Times

Rosaline Barendregt from the Netherlands is a well known staff member at the Madeira Bridge Festival. For four years now she works here as a tournament director. But did you know is an excellent bridge player in her own right? This summer for instance she represented her country at the European University Bridge Championships in Croatia. On that occasion she stole an impossible 3NT. The way Rosaline deceived her opponents made great impression to Philip Alder,


one of America's leading bridge journalists. In fact Alder wrote about the hand in his column in the New York Times. Have a look yourself:

Eight Tricks Are Obvious, but the Ninth?

Nearly 20 women competed in the first European Universities Championship, which was held in Opatija, Croatia, from Oct. 4 to 10. One, Rosaline Barendregt, playing for The Hague, found a clever ruse in the diagramed deal from the match against Athens.




In three no-trump she seemed to have only eight winners: one heart, two diamonds and five clubs. What was

her ninth trick?

At the other table Gerbrand Hop (West for The Hague) bought the contract in three diamonds. Konstantinos Doxiadis (North for Athens) found the effective lead of a low heart. Then, when Konstantinos Kontomitros (South) got in with a top diamond, he returned a heart and received a heart ruff. The defense therefore took one heart, two diamonds, one club and the heart ruff for down one.

The balancing one-no-trump overcall by Barendregt (South) showed some 11 to 14 points, so the jump to three



	no-trump by Natalia Banas was aggressive. (Yes, she
Related	might have transferred to hearts first, to offer a choice of

Barendregt, apparently fighting a losing battle, won the first trick with the diamond king and led a low spade from her hand.

East took that and returned a diamond, but South won with the ace and cashed her club tricks. West, thinking that he had to keep his spades, promptly discarded the heart ten and heart king.

A low heart to dummy's ace brought down West's queen, and declarer took her ninth trick with the heart jack. Did you guess that?

Minus 100 and plus 600 gave The Hague 11 international match points en route to victory in the match by 29 imps.

Although this ruse of leading your weakest suit as early as possible is well known, it continues to work.



Big Start

Things got out with a big start yesterday. The very first board of the warm-up tournament was a Grand Slam hand.

Board 1



As you may see, looking only at the EW hands, there are 14 top tricks, whatever the distribution of the NS hands, with all the 10's and 9's just to make sure. (The unfortunate mirrored shape in Hearts and Clubs makes it impossible to try for a 15^{th} trough an unlikely squeeze). So it seems surprising that there were as many pairs playing a Grand Slam as there were playing no Slam at all (!).

The underbid prize goes to a local pair that through a (slight) bidding misunderstanding ended up in the super-solid contract of 2. Not even Deep Finesse could manage to make a dent to it.

On the other hand our winning pair from yesterday's session, Martin Schifko and Sascha Wernle managed easily enough to get to 7NT. This is how I'm told the bidding went:

Only three more pairs managed to get to the optimum place of 7NT, another one to $7 ilde{A}$ and finally another to $7 ilde{A}$.

I don't know how the bidding went on the other tables, but you may reach it with very few gadgets. Here is how it might go with very simple bidding:
