I'm not convinced this is the auction - did West really bid 4♦ all on his own? More likely East bid 2♦ over 2♣. South's 3♥ was very aggressive and it was matched by North's decision to go on to game. It was tempting to bid 5♦ over 4♥, but it turned a potential +500 into -50.

Having bid 4♥ West decided to take out insurance on the next round. Getting the trumps wrong meant the premium against the non-making game was -300.

Declarer won the trump switch (too late the hero) in hand, cross-ruffed clubs and hearts, drew the outstanding trumps and cashed two long clubs for +790.

Declarer won with the king, cashed two clubs pitching dummy's last spade and ruffed a spade with the ♥9. North overruffed, but declarer could not be prevented from taking the rest, winning the heart exit in hand and ruffing a club with dummy's ♥Q for +730.

In short, if someone wants to check that there is no hanky-panky going on with the procedure they should:

- 1 – Download the "present key" from <http://bit.ly/2018pKs> or click on link in footer menu on new website
- 2 – Check Euromillions lottery numbers (the "future key")
- 3 – Download the "past key" that will be published after the event (presumably in Bulletin 7)
- 4 – Run the program (download from <http://www.xs4all.nl/~sater/SquareDeal.zip>) using the 3-part key according to the instructions – the "present" and "past" files and insert the 5 numbers and 2 stars, as presented in the official results, comma separated, when prompted by the program.
- 5 – Compare the hands generated this way with the hands actually played.
