Today I settled down to watch a few slam hands – there were at least seven floating around, according to our finessing friend, this afternoon and they generally make much more exciting reading than a part-score. We all love a slam. I did not have to wait long for two to come along.

Along comes the 6th slam of the session. At the table I watched, a straightforward bidding sequence which ended in 6♥ (but not before 6♠ inadvertently hit the table for a stomach-churning moment but was quickly flicked aside (sticky bidding cards)).

The play was also straightforward, after the spade lead, declarer cashes the major suit winners and North is inexorably squeezed in the minors. To hold declarer to 12 tricks it is necessary to cash the diamond ace at trick one.

The question is, should you convert to 6NT at matchpointed pairs? Partner has two keycards and a spade lead might make life awkward if partner's two keycards are ♦A and K♥, or ♦A and ♥A with ♥Kx off side..... it depends on whether you want to play bridge or poker. I will look at the results and report back tomorrow.

The last slam of the day could easily have been passed out in a part-score. N/S did well when I watched this hand, reaching 5♦ and almost reaching the cold 6♦.

North did well to bid 3♦, but later in the auction if they can find a 4♥ bid on the way to 5♦ then South may well bid six for an excellent board.

The play to make 6♦ is routine, winning the club lead and ruffing spades twice to set the suit up before drawing trumps. Well done to anyone who bid 6♦.



The Slamometer

The last session of the Pairs Championship is one to set the pulse racing, with many deals in the slam zone. I have picked four of them:

That might not be the best sequence, but it is where you would like to play.

Say South leads a spade. You take the ace and now have an opportunity to do something clever by playing a heart to the ace and a heart (it is often a sound strategy to develop the side suit first). When South shows out but cannot ruff in front of dummy, you have a blueprint for all thirteen tricks.

I predict this will happen maybe 3 times.

If East leads a high diamond declarer must win in dummy and cash the ♠AQ. When East follows he is known to have at best one heart, so declarer continues with the ♥K. When East discards it is necessary to change tack and play the ♣Q. Three rounds of the suit see dummy ruff, and the ♥2 comes next. West has to play an honour and declarer wins and plays a heart to the eight.

Suppose South is in 6♠ doubled and West leads



a heart, East ruffing and returning the ♠J. Declarer must win in hand, cash the ♦A, ruff a diamond, play a heart to the king and play another diamond. It won't help West to ruff, so he discards a club and declarer ruffs, cashes the ♠K and the ♥A, ruffs a heart and plays the ♠Q. West has already been squeezed into coming down to two clubs and one heart and now East, looking at ♦K ♣1097 has no good move - a classic non-simultaneous double squeeze.

Anyone who manages that should report immediately to me in the Bulletin Room!

I'm not expecting a rush.

I predict everyone will bid 6♥.

If South leads the ♠K declarer wins with dummy's ace pitching a diamond and plays eight rounds of hearts, squeezing North in the minors for all the tricks.

That will happen often - at least 50% of the time.

I'll also guess that at least one pair will bid and make 7♥!

Play The Card You Are Known to Hold

In payment for recharging his iPhone I persuaded Dennis Bilde to give me a story. His hand was ♠xx ♥Kx ♦x ♣AKQJ9653. First to speak all vulnerable he opened 1♣, cannot be criticized, as my editor is wont to say. The bidding continued as follows

At this point West produced the actual ♣5 card from his hand and put it on the table, much to the amusement of those present. This was followed by two passes and South pressed on with 5♦. Having come this far, West realised he had the ♣6 card in his hand and so placed it on the green baize to even louder merriment and it ended the auction, as N/S did not find a red card in their bidding box. The contract failed by the obvious three tricks.

No news to report on Lift front – mainly due to much less lift travel as fear factor has taken hold.

Mark's predictions for Board 4 was that only a handful would take 11 tricks in a heart contract.

Everyone played in game and nearly three quarters of the pairs played in Four Hearts. Of these about half made the contract on the nose while the rest split 50-50 failing or making an overtrick. On sixteen occasions the contract arrived at too high a level, thirteen times in slam and three times at the five-level, none of these was successful. The other seven pairs played in 3NT or 5♣.

On Board 5 Mark said no one would make ten tricks in no-trumps on a non-diamond lead.

Excepting four pairs, everyone played in 3NT and 14 times declarer made ten tricks when the lead was not a diamond. On all but six of the 34 times when a diamond was the lead of choice did declarer not take more than nine tricks. On this

occasion the prediction cannot be considered accurate. Did Mark underestimate the declarers' ability or was the defence wanting? My money is on the defence.

For Board 18 Mark proposed that declarer would always make more than nine tricks in a no-trump contract.

25 times the contract was 3NT and only once was it held to nine tricks. Unsurprisingly the majority favoured playing there 5-3 heart fit but they fared badly in the matchpoint battle as the 'no-trumpers' nearly always scored as many or more tricks than those playing in a suit. I think we can score this one as a success for Mark.

The most popular contract was 4♠ which was played 28 times and never failed, the second most popular contract of 6♦ succeeded ten times and



failed nine. With 15 attempts, 3NT was next on the list and made eleven times. The slam in clubs, spades and no-trumps was each bid twice and all failed save one of the 6♣ contracts. So the prediction of 6♣ being bid three times was not far off but the success rate was not as good as the prediction.

The World Online

Every bridge player in the world is about to get the chance to become the World Online Champion in a competition that will run from March to November 2020 and win at least US\$100,000.

A New Bridge Magazine (www.newbridgemag.com) will be publishing all the information next month, but meanwhile the organisers are running a test consisting of two daylong tournaments, one played at IMPs the other at matchpoints.

The Funbridge WBF Robots site - www.funbridge.com - will host both contests on Thursday 12 December 2019.

Entry to the tournaments is free, and the top five players in each of them will win a one-year subscription to Funbridge.

In addition, the next 250 players from each event will win 10 WBF Robot Tournament entries.

WBF Robot Master Points will be awarded and NBO's may decide to offer their own master points.

In addition, Funbridge and the WBF are sponsoring three new IBPA awards for play in online events: Best Declarer Play, Best Defence and Best Bid hand. These awards will carry the same cash value to journalists and players as the regular annual IBPA awards. You can write up your candidate deals yourselves and submit them directly to the editor of the IBPA bulletin at: ibpaeditor@sympatico.ca, or ask a journalist to write up a deal for you.
