The Open Pairs Spring To Life

50 pairs across 25 tables joined together to contest the three session Open Pairs. At the end of the first session Tim van den Bos and Berend van den Bos from The Netherlands headed the championships with 64.06%, behind are Peter Jokisch and Udo Kasimir from Germany with a score of 62.15%. In third position with a score of 60.76% are the Portuguese pair Inês Cunha and Miguel Ramos



New Safety Regulations

It is compulsory to wear a mask in all public spaces and circulation areas, both inside and in the open air, except at the beach, or while eating or drinking at a restaurant or bar.

In the playing area, masks may be removed while seated at the table, but must be put on when leaving the table (even to move between tables). Whenever a cleaning break is called, everyone must leave the playing area.

National regulations may change at any moment; if they do, we will post the changes in the bulletins.



Today is the Traditional Madeiran Dinner at O Lagar. The coach will leave the VidaMar hotel at 20:15. You will need your badge to get on the bus.

Keeping You Safe

We are instigating protocols to ensure your safety whilst playing bridge. There are the six main areas.

1. There will be NO board sharing. Each table will have a complete set of boards for the whole session.

2. Competitors will be issued with a Bidding Box, It will be labelled with the player's Bridgemate number and they will only use that box for the whole tournament.

3. The table and its equipment will be completely cleaned every eight to ten deals. This includes the table itself, the screen, the Bridgemate and the chairs.

4. Every table will have a transparent perspex screen separating each player from the others.

5. Every table is at least two metres from any other table.

6. Every eight to ten boards competitors will be asked to leave the room and take fresh air for a minimum of five minutes.

All Events take place in the Congress Centre - it will open one hour before play commences.

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José Curado explains how to verify the deals using Hans van Staveren's procedure.

In short, if someone wants to check that there is no hanky-panky going on with the procedure they should:

1. Download the “present key” before 19:30 on Friday evening 30th October 2020
2. Check the winning Euromillions numbers for Friday 30th October 2020 (the “future key”).
3. Download the “past key” which will be published after the event (in Bulletin 7 and here)
4. Run the program (download from <http://www.xs4all.nl/~sater/SquareDeal.zip>) using the 3-part key according to the instructions: the “present” and “past” files and the 5 numbers and 2 stars from the lottery results, comma separated (the program will prompt you).
5. Compare the hands generated this way with the hands actually played.

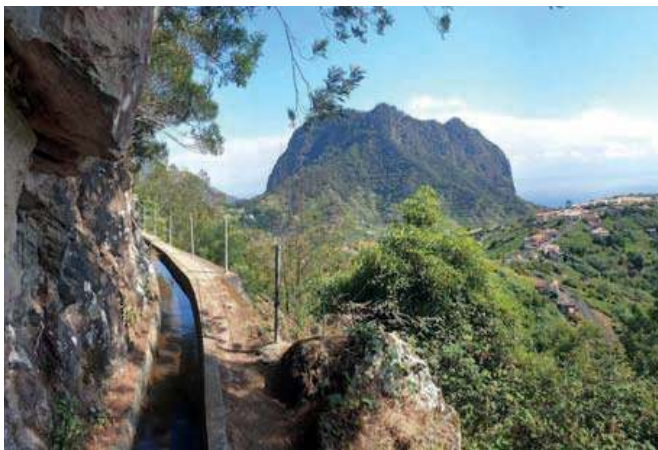
Option A: The East (full day, lunch included)
coach leaves hotel 09:30



The coach leaves the hotel at 9:30 for the drive up to Pico do Areeiro, Madeira's third-highest peak (1818m), from which you may enjoy the breathtaking views. From the mountain head down to Ribeiro Frio to admire the famous laurisilva forest (UNESCO World Heritage site), with an optional short levada walk to the Balcões viewpoint (level, easy, ≈ 30 minutes).

The next stop is Santana, with its traditional thatched houses and its vineyards. After lunch at the Quinta do Furão, drive to Ponta de São Lourenço, the far eastern headland, which boasts a wonderful combination of volcanic rocks, blue sea and nature. You will have time to take photographs before heading back to the hotel.

Option B: Levada Walk (½ day, lunch included)
coach leaves hotel 09:45



The coach leaves the hotel at 9:45 for a relaxing, easy 7km half-day walk along one of Madeira's famed levadas.

The walk starts at Referta, on the north-eastern side of the island, and leads walkers on an exploration of some of the native fauna and flora of Madeira and its abundant and varied fruit trees. In the first part of the walk, you will be able to admire the imposing volcanic outcrop of Penha de Águia and enjoy the agricultural terraces cultivated by local residents.

Lunch at the Quinta do Furão before returning to the hotel.

Please bring good walking shoes or boots, a warm coat (in case of low temperatures in the mountains) and a bottle of water. Grade: easy; Distance: 7 km; Duration: approximately 2¾ hours.

After arriving in Madeira a week ago to work on the Bulletin for the 2nd year (I was invited back – so clearly, I did not embarrass myself or my co-workers too much last year), I found myself in the very fortunate position of being asked to play with a German who had travelled here alone, undeterred, after her partner cancelled. Indeed, there are many players who have overcome the most extraordinary hurdles this year to get here. I have yet to meet someone who did not have their flight cancelled at least once. My personal best was four flights cancelled, and I met another German pair who had their flights rearranged five times. Any advances? Let me know for the Epic Journeys section of the bulletin later this week.

Having found my new partner, Marie Eggeling, lurking apprehensively outside the conference centre we quickly threw a system together, crossed our fingers, donned our masks and hoped for the best. Despite the lack of the aforementioned system, my partner showed good judgment and touching faith in the bidding on this hand for a joint top.

7♣ actually makes on a heart finesse. The play requires care but the contract cannot be defeated.

This is a classic case of counting your tricks - on first glance you can count five club tricks, three spades, one heart (two if the finesse works) and one diamond – the heart finesse works, so you have 11 tricks in the bag. It is now a relatively simple matter to arrange two heart ruffs in the dummy before crossing to your hand with a high ruff of a diamond or spade to draw the last trump and claim 13 tricks. Indeed, only two other pairs matched the top score, most people playing in a languid 3NT and one other pair doing well to bid 6♣ but perhaps not counting their tricks as above, and making just 12.

Mystic Mark - Edition II

Mark Horton

Mark Horton cannot provide you with the winning numbers for the next EuroMillions draw, but he is prepared to predict what might happen on some of the deals from the first session of the Pairs Championship.

If North is unwise enough to come in with 2♠ East's penalty double should be worth at least 500, which is likely to be close to a top.


The fate of 3NT will probably depend on how declarer tackles the club suit. When the ten is covered by the queen the normal line is to continue with a top honour.

However, under certain circumstances declarer might get home with only three club tricks. If South leads a passive heart declarer wins and plays the ♣10 covered by the queen and ace. Looking for overtricks, declarer then takes two rounds of hearts and North wins and switches to a diamond for the nine, ten and four. Declarer wins the next diamond, crosses to dummy with a club, cashes the ♥10 and the ♣J and then plays a spade to the ace and exits with the ♦J, scoring the last trick with the ♦6.

If North returns the ♠K rather than a diamond in one line declarer might make the contract while scoring only two club tricks! I'll let you work that one out.

With most of the field reaching game I predict just under 50% will make it.

Not everyone will reach 3NT via this exact sequence.

As on the previous deal the club suit has an important role to play.

If West leads the ♥10 let's say East allows declarer to win with the jack. Now declarer needs to play a club to the ten, when the 19% chance that this will deliver 5 tricks in the suit pays off.

If declarer happens to play the king or queen, then East should duck. Winning and switching to a spade allows declarer to win and play a heart to the eight. East wins and plays a second spade and declarer ducks, wins the next spade and exits with a heart. East wins, but that will be the last trick for the defence as West cannot cope with the pressure in spades, diamonds and clubs.

Most of the field should reach game. at least half will make it.

Let's imagine West leads a diamond. Declarer wins in dummy, and in the manner of the Rueful Rabbit sets out to do as much ruffing as possible. The ♥A is followed by a heart ruff, two diamonds to pitch a club from dummy, the ♣A and a club ruff, another heart ruff and a club, ruffed by West with the ♠5 and overruffed in dummy. In the four-card ending declarer plays a heart and discards a minor suit card from hand. West has to ruff and lead a spade and declarer wins in hand and cross-ruffs the last two tricks.

If you reach 6♠ and make it let me (and the Bulletin) know!

I predict a handful of pairs will reach 6♠. Maybe one will find the way home?

Once the diamond fit comes to light a series of cue-bids leads to the reasonable slam.

With the trump suit behaving there is nothing to the play.

Mark prophesied that nearly 50% would defend against 4♠ by bidding 5♥. Three pairs were allowed to defend with 4♥ for 50% of the matchpoints as three pairs stayed in 3♠. One N/S pair overreached themselves by climbing to the dizzy heights of 6♦, never a good result to bid a slam missing two aces. Another surprising result was 3NT+1 from the South hand – was it East who never showed the heart suit or did West fail to believe partner's bid?

I think we can award a couple of stars as E/W did defend 25% of the time.

Here Mark suggested that there would be many in 6♣ but a small percentage would try for the matchpoint bonus of 6NT. Half the field managed to get to the club slam with one pair going a level too high by trying for the grand slam, which unsurprisingly failed. 25% played in no-trumps but no one got to slam and the other two pairs



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played in different black suit games. This time I shall be generous with three stars as over 50% reached a slam.

So in summary about half the time the outcome was as predicted, which I think is fairly good as no matter what you suggest there will

always be a small but substantial minority that will veer off from the chosen path.

Let us see how Mark performs tomorrow with a larger field and a more serious event – The Open Pairs.
