The Longest Day

A long day of six sessions, leaving three for final day on Sunday, saw five teams win 20-0. In Round 3: Still Going Stronks, Round 5: Hole in One, Round 6: Astro, Round 7: Petra and in Round 8: DPS. The rankings at the end of the day had **Wrang Lead** leading with a score of 115.23 whilst in second place **BCO** with 106.89 are ahead of **The Maltese Falcons** on 106.35. All to play for tomorrow.

Pairs Prize Collection

If you have won a prize in a Pairs event (lists of winners within this bulletin) then please come to the Bulletin Office (Selvagens 5 Tower 2) between 12.00 and 14.30 to collect your prize.

As many of you are aware on Friday night shortly after play had started in the Open Teams there was a medical emergency when a player collapsed with a heart attack. Paulo Pessanha, a doctor from the mainland was immediately at his side and within seconds Nuno Paz, another doctor was assisting him. The ambulance was called and meanwhile the two doctors carried out resuscitation and had the patient breathing. The ambulance crews arrived and strove ceaselessly to revive him, and after about 45 minutes he was stable enough to be moved to hospital, although unfortunately he died later.

Erkki Juuri-Oja was a regular visitor to Madeira since 2007. His bridge career involved playing in at least twelve European Team Championships, eight European Pairs Championships with Pirjo his wife, and three times was the NPC of Finnish teams. At the start of play on Saturday there was a respectful one minute silence in memory of him. Our thoughts and prayers are with his friends and family and especially his wife Pirjo.





North led the ♠J and declarer won with dummy's ace and ran the ♥Q, North taking the king and returning the ♠K. Declarer ruffed, played a heart to the jack and a club for the ten, jack and king. North exited with a club but declarer won with dummy's queen and played a diamond to the ten for +620.

Some partnerships play that a double by South of $2 \triangleq$ shows a high spade honour, the idea being to help partner with the lead. Here it might be enough for North to go to $4 \triangleq$, despite the poor 7-2-2-2 pattern.

Despite the shape North went 'all-in' at the first opportunity.

East led the ♥Q and West took the ace, cashed the ♣A and continued with the five. Declarer won with the king, cashed the ♥K and played the ♠8.

When East ducked, declarer ruffed a club and exited with a spade. East won and had to play a diamond – it was a good job that West also held the ten!

That was one down, -100 but an 11 IMP gain.




South led the ♥K and declarer won with dummy's ace and played back the two, South cashing the queen and jack as North pitched the ♣4. South cashed the ♣A and continued with the six, declarer taking dummy's king and continuing with the ◆3. North went in with the king and played the ♣10, but declarer ruffed with the ◆10 and played a diamond to the jack and ace. North persisted with the ♣J, which promoted South's ◆9 for one down, -100.

North led the ♥3 and declarer took the third round of the suit, North discarding, and exited with the ♠8. Declarer's best move now is to play either the ace or queen of spades (or a diamond) but the ♠3 allowed North to win with the jack. Switching to a club puts the defenders on track for three down, but North exited with the ♠7 and declarer won with the ten and cashed the ace and queen before exiting with a diamond. The defenders now cashed their tricks, declarer scoring the last one with dummy's ♠Q, two down, -300 and another 5 IMPs.



With a hopeless hand North followed the sound strategy of trying to find partner at home somewhere. Knowing declarer did not have four hearts out came the ♥5 and that meant +50 and 10 more IMPs.

East led the ◆K and West took the next diamond with the ace and played two rounds of spades. A spade ruff and a heart added up to two down, -100.

South might have considered bidding 3♣ rather than raising hearts. If North has East's ♥Q it might be essential for South to get on lead if West is in 3NT.

It was hardly obvious for West to rebid 3NT – perhaps East should double 3♥, although again that is a marginal decision, probably justified by the fitting diamond honours.

North cashed the ♥A, but failed to find the club switch that would have led to one down (another reason for South to bid 3♣!). Even so, +130 cost 8 IMPs.

That's my best guess at the early part of the auction – the BBO record shows no alerts!

North led the ♦2 for the five, queen and ace and declarer took two rounds of clubs ending in dummy and then played a diamond for the nine and ten. North exited with the \uparrow 7 and when declarer pitched dummy's ♥2 South ruffed and played the ♣Q. Declarer ruffed with dummy's ♠4 and North overruffed and played the ◆K. Declarer ruffed with the ♠A and played a spade to the jack, but North won and exited with a heart, declarer claiming the rest when the finesse won, -50.

One way to make 4♠ is for declarer to ruff the third round of clubs with the ♠J. North overruffs and plays a diamond but declarer can ruff with dummy's ace of spades and play a spade collecting South's ten. Ruffing with the ♠K also works as declarer can take the heart finesse and then play a spade to the king. East when you can see all the hands!

North led the ♣6 and declarer won with the king and played a heart to the queen. When that held a spade to the jack was enough for nine tricks, +400 and 10 match-winning IMPs.





On the positive side North had an ace and fair support for clubs; on the other hand she was devoid of any distributional assets. These factors had to be balanced against the fact that partner had wandered in at the four-level. I suspect the majority vote would be to raise to game. It would have saved 10 IMPs.

South led the ◆7 and North won with the ace and switched to the ♥5 which was all the help declarer needed – the likely two down having been turned into a potentially plus score. South won with the ace and returned the nine for the jack, king and a ruff and declarer continued with the ♣Q, South taking the ace and playing a heart for the seven, ten and a ruff. Declarer cashed the ♣K, ruffed a club and pitched a club on the ♥8, but South ruffed and played the ♣10, North's ruff with the ♠10 ensuring two trump tricks for his partner, -50.

Having ruffed the second heart if declarer plays on trumps South is helpless.

Here North returned the ◆8 at trick two and South ruffed and switched to the ◆7, declarer winning with the king and exiting with the ♥Q. North won and returned the ♥5, South taking the ace when declarer pitched the ◆7. She cashed the ◆A and then played safe by cashing the ◆A for -50 and a flat board.



Here North returned the ♦6 at trick two and South ruffed and played the ♥4, North putting up the king and continuing with the ♦5. Declarer ruffed with the ♠J and South made the mistake of overruffing rather than discarding a club. She then cashed the ♣A which meant the contact had gone from two down to making in the blink of an eye. Declarer ruffed the next club in dummy, drew trumps and claimed, +110 to lose 2 IMPs.

I confess I would have doubled 2♠ with North's hand at all four tables!

South led the ◆5 and declarer won in dummy and ran the ♥10, South taking the queen and exiting with the ♠9 for the ace and queen. Declarer ruffed a club and played two rounds of hearts, one down, -100.

North led the ◆J and declarer won with the king, cashed the ◆A and then tried the ◆A. South ruffed and had only to exit with a spade to leave declarer short of tricks. Her choice of the ♣Q allowed declarer to win, play a heart to the ace, ruff a heart, ruff a club and exit with a spade. North had to win and was endplayed, +620 and 12 IMPs, and a winning margin of 9 IMPs.

One of the winning lines as the cards lie is for declarer to cross to the ♥A at trick three, ruff a heart, ruff a club, ruff a heart, ruff a club and exit with a spade. No doubt you can find several others.

Deal of the Day

In Round 3 of the Open Pairs this was perhaps the most eye-catching board:

East led the ♣2 and when dummy's ten held declarer, wanting to cater for a singleton ace with West, played the ♥9 to the king followed by a heart to the jack, West electing to duck. Declarer played three rounds of diamonds, ruffing, followed by a spade to the king and ace. When East discarded on the ♠Q declarer continued with the ten, covered and ruffed, played the queen of clubs to the king and cashed the ♠9 discarding the ♣A. At trick 12 a spade ensured that West would score only one trump trick, +980 which left their opponents with only a single matchpoint.

Very well played I'm sure you will agree, but West missed a chance. If he wins the second round of hearts and exits with a club, a vital entry is removed from dummy and the loss of a second trump trick will be inevitable.

If declarer is willing to gave up on the possibility of a singleton ♥A then playing the ♥J at trick two followed by a heart to the king leaves West with no winning option. An applaud to East, as any other lead would have left the defenders with no real hope.





In the open room aginst Three Clubs, the ♠Q was led to the king and ace and the nine of spades (an expensive card as it turns out) returned to the 10 and jack. West now switched to the ♠2 to put declarer on an early guess. Those of you that remember Ron's Rule from earlier in the week (if you have to guess where the ace is, assume it is in the hand of the person who made the opening lead) will know what to do. Declarer must have

read the Bulletin, and he inserted the king which held the trick. Declarer now played the master ♠8 from dummy, discarding his losing diamond on it. Now came fiverounds of clubs, the ♥AK and a club, conceding the last trick for plus one and 130 but it was not good enough to match the 2NT+1 and 150 made in the closed room, and 1 IMP to 16 Flights.






Both teams bid to 3NT by North after a jump overcall in Spades by East.



The game is cold – I was surprised that North-South did not bid it, after South's 3♥ bid, with North holding a 16 count and a singleton club. A NV game swing to Dandylion.

Both sides bid to $4 \checkmark$ on this board for another flat board, both missing the heart slam. I think that your bidding methods would have to be a factor here to reach $6 \checkmark$.

If you play change of suit is forcing, the bidding can proceed :

Now if 3♣ is a splinter (because 2♣ is forcing for one round, so a jump-bid is a shortage) North is very interested and will bid the slam in his sleep. However, if you don't play this, South's rebid has to be 3♥ as his hand is not quite good enough to splinter in 4♣ and you will likely subside in 4♥.

Well done to those pairs who had the methods available to them to bid 6.

The match result was close with a 7-4 IMP win to Dandylion after a scattering of IMPs changed hands but the game swing on Board 14 giving the edge to the Belarusian-German combination.
