Optional Excursions Friday 11th November

Option A: The North West (full day, inc. lunch)
coach leaves hotel 09.30



First stop Fanal, with its magical dancing forest and – depending on the weather – its looking-glass lake brim full. Next we descend towards Porto Moniz and the famous natural bathing pools; then Seixal and a 15-20 minute walk to one of the prettiest black beaches in Europe, with a magnificent vista from the varied shades of green of the mountains to the blue sea.

We take lunch at São Vicente at about 13.20, and will then visit the Volcanism Centre near the grottos of São Vicente (the caves are currently closed, but if they have reopened by November a guided tour will be included). We return to Funchal via Serra de Água where you may try a glass of poncha, a product of our island.

Arrive back at VidaMar at approximately 16.15.

Option C: Catamaran (limited availability)
coach leaves hotel 10.00



A relaxing trip along the south coast of Madeira, with a good chance of spotting whales and dolphins in all their magnificence and in their natural habitat. (3 hours).

Option B: Levada Walk (½ day, lunch included)
coach leaves hotel 09.45



Our first stop will be Paúl da Serra, the widest and longest plateau on the island at 24km². From here our walk along the wonderful Levada do Alecrim* (the Rosemary Levada) will take about 2¼ hours.

We will take lunch at São Vicente, on the island's north coast, and on the way back to Funchal will stop at the famous poncho bar at Serra de Água, where you may taste this popular and typical madeiran drink.

Return to VidaMar at approximately 15.30.

Please bring good walking shoes or boots, a warm coat (in case of low temperatures in the mountains) and a bottle of water. Grade: easy; Distance: 7 km; Duration: approximately 2¼ hours.

**If the weather at Paúl da Serra is inclement, as it can be in November, we will head downhill and walk the Levada da Fajã da Ama (the Nursemaid's Cliff Levada) at São Vicente, near the Estrada das Ginjas (Cherry Road); the degree of difficulty is the same, but this levada is at a lower altitude.*

Early Doors

Early Doors is an expression used in sports to denote the first phases of a game. It is frequently used by football pundits and a such has become an iconic saying. So here in Madeira I am reporting 'Early Doors' on the pre-events

After a somewhat traumatic journey to this beautiful island I set up base camp in a new venue – the former Koi restaurant. This is where you will find the bulletin team ensconced and there you can regale them with your stories of derring-do at the bridge table. We are always eager to receive news of interesting or amusing happenings.

As in the past couple of years we hope to have your bulletins available at breakfast time, however, should you be tardy in rising they will also be available at the Welcome Desk. Further copies will be available in the Congress Centre thirty minutes before play commences. Earlier editions will be placed on the table under the results screen next to the Welcome Desk.

To increase the chance of finding some early copy I teamed up with Ceri, another member of the bulletin team, and we entered the Portuguese National Simultaneous Pairs. We fared reasonably well, finishing in sixth position which was, perhaps a generous reflection on our labours. On Board 20 I made one of my most egregious bidding decisions. I held:

♠ A 10965
♥ 98632
♦ 63
♣ 8

My partner opened a strong no trump and I responded with Stayman, more in hope than expectation. I was planning on bidding 2♥ after the expected 2♦ response. We had agreed to play non-promissory Stayman so my 2♥ would be a weak bid. So I was momentarily flustered when partner essayed 2♥. I then got myself into a state of confusion and started thinking along the lines that we are playing pairs not teams and somehow I convinced myself not to immediately bid game. Fortunately it seems that the majority of the other pairs did likewise. When you stop and analyse

the hand it is a powerhouse. The fifth trump is worth a king and then you also have a singleton and another five-card suit. I make that the hand is worth 10+ distributional points. So how good was the hand? When I tell you that there were twelve tricks for the taking (albeit with two successful finesses) I think it shows what a poor bid I made.

We joined forces again to play in the first edition of the IMP Pairs where we again had a modest session finishing in seventh place. One hand amused me, it was Board 4.

I cannot recall having a 29 count before and as we were a scratch partnership our system had not got down to the finer points of bidding hands in excess of 25 points. I started with our game-forcing bid of 2♦ and unsurprisingly heard a response of 2♥. I toyed with bidding 4NT which I hoped would be taken as quantitative and so with a four plus count bid the small slam but decided that this was unlikely to arrive at the best result so I made a classic 'bid what you think you can make' bids and placed the 6NT card on the green baize. The contract is not without hope, a 3-3 spade break will bring home the bacon. So after a heart lead to the queen and ace I cashed three rounds of spades to get the bad news about them. I now had to consider if I had any genuine chance of making the contract or should I play for some sort of pseudo-squeeze. My only hope seemed to be that the hand with the short spades held the king and queen of diamonds and would be put to the test when he came down to four cards.



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West did not help partner by coming down to one spade, two diamonds and a heart. East now had to decide whether to keep two cards in each red suit or three diamonds. Luckily for me it was the 2-2 decision and so now a small diamond brought forth the queen and when I regained the lead with my king of hearts the ace of diamonds felled the king leaving my jack good for the twelfth trick.

On the third day we rose again to our new office and decided that due to pressure of work we would allow the pleasure of playing in the second IMP Pairs event to others. My duties required me to journey over to the Congress Centre and I took the opportunity to kibitz Eduardo Fernandes and his partner Pedro Morgado against Miguel Teixeira and Carlos Luiz for a couple of boards.

Before dummy came down Eduardo indicated to me that he thought the contract should have been 6♦, and he was right. The board was close to being flat in 3NT but the question remains as to how to arrive at the slam. The problem is that someone has to take a rosy view of their hand. It probably has to be West and maybe, just maybe, he could try 4♣ rather than 3NT. In this case partner will cue-bid hearts and now you are off to the races. Even though he did not bid the slam, Eduardo and his partner won the event.

Sections For Open Pairs

In the Open Pairs there will be up to eight sections, each designated by a letter and a colour. Section A,B,G and H will be in the Selvagens on Level 4 of Tower 2, just past the Welcome Desk, sections C, D, E, and F will be in the Congress Centre.

The colours will be as follows:

- A Yellow
- B Light Blue
- C Orange
- D Light Green
- E Dark Blue
- F Light Purple
- G Dark Green

I was intending a watching brief in Sunday's Charity Pairs, but when Carlos Luiz dropped by to kibitz, we decided to play – remarkably the first time we have sat opposite each other in the 25 years of the Festival.

East's decision to open 4♠ left little room for manoeuvre. If N/S can make 11 tricks then it is likely that 4♠ will go down, so I decided to let matters rest. When I elected to lead the ♦2 declarer was not hard pressed to record an overtrick and pick up 10.1 IMPs.

Notice that if N/S play in 5♥ the defenders need to do the right thing. On a spade lead declarer wins and plays back a spade, putting East in the hot seat. That's one reason why if East opens 3♠ West might do well to respond 4♦ - a fit non-jump.

My optimistic decision to cue-bid 5♣ got us close to the slam that cannot be defeated, even if declarer does not divine the spade position. Only one pair bid this slam, which was worth 11.1 IMPs.

When West led the ♣K, 4♠ was rapidly put to the sword, finishing three down, -150. Given that with careful play E/W can make 4♥ (declarer wins the spade lead, plays a heart to the queen discovering the bad break and must then take the spade ruff and play on clubs) that did not look too bad, but only one pair managed to take 10 tricks (doubled to boot!) so 3.4 IMPs went away.

North led the ♥3 and declarer took dummy's ace and cashed three clubs. I discarded an 'encouraging' ♦10 and declarer, convinced that the diamond finesse was working, took two more clubs, pitching a diamond, before taking the diamond finesse. North won and exited with a diamond and declarer could not manage more than eight tricks, a gift of 10.5 IMPs.

North led the ♦6 and declarer won with dummy's ace and ran the ♥9, North winning with the king and returning a diamond. With hearts 4-2 declarer was in deep trouble and went three down, -500 to lose 9.9 IMPs.

Only four pairs managed to take 10 tricks in hearts – luckily Carlos was one of them and it was worth 10.5 IMPs.

On a spade lead the simple line is to win in dummy, ruff a spade and play a heart for the queen and king. You ruff the spade return, cash the ♥J and then run the ♦10.

South has shown up with the ♦A and it is a simple counting exercise to place North with all of the remaining points and both of the missing queens for his double of 1♣. Declarer can finesse the ♠Q, draw trumps and return to dummy with the ♣A to take the ♣Q finesse. 10 tricks and a nice score for the opps - six pairs had managed to go one off and two pairs failed to bid the game,

Partner passed West's opening 1♥ bid in tempo. East had nothing to say. I doubled. West Passed. – North Passed – and for a change North had his bid.

The contract was not a success and went for 1100. There was little declarer could do, except make the king of diamonds, play a club to the king and hope to make a trump somewhere along the way.

It is quite unusual for a freely bid 1 level contract to go four off. We estimate the odds of that are about one in 50,000. Maybe East could have considered a rescue redouble to limit the damage.

One other pair, Han Begas and Lucia Grosman also collected 1100 defending 1♥ doubled, so our opponents were not quite alone.

Four North/South pairs played in 4♥ which is probably quite tricky to reach after a 1♥ opening from West. It would take some convincing for South to accept that North's repeated heart bids were natural, but 3NT is also cold and five pairs ended up in that spot.

Firstly, there is a thin case for East to bid 4♥ instead of 3♥. The hand is a minimal opening hand but improves when partner bids 2♥. With a 9th trump, some players I know would re-evaluate their hand and count that as another king and have a stab at 4♥ at IMP scoring.

However, if you settle for a 3♥ bid, West surely must now bid four in his sleep with a good trump suit, seven loser hand and the king of spades working.

11 pairs bid to four, six pairs bid to three. Three pairs allowed North/South to play in 2♠ or 3♦.

Making 4♥ is routine, as East holds the magic ♣10, allowing the ♣Q to be picked up. You lose just the ace of trumps and the ace of spades.

Four North/South pairs found a sacrifice in 4♠ which should only make 7 tricks - three off doubled for 500 is not a complete disaster at IMP scoring, and in reality, the contract was only doubled once and only went two off three times. Fortune (sometime) favours the brave. After a singleton diamond lead, a diamond ruff and a club return, East must resist giving partner a 2nd diamond ruff or cashing a 2nd club, and instead return a heart to set up the 3rd undertrick.
