


# Teams Round 2

After the first round, teams Tolle and Stonecutters found themselves on table 2 and an in a match of two halves, an exciting four boards ensued.



In the closed room, North/South reached the same destination by a different route. When South saw her partner's club fit, she jumped to 4♠ to show the quality of her spade suit which North was happy to pass. A slam would not have been out of the question - all North needs is two aces. However, North had no such intentions on this occasion.

4♠ rolled home with an overtrick at both tables with nothing of particular interest to report in the play when the trumps broke 3-3.

Some pairs stopped in  $2 \spadesuit$  on this board, which is a bit of a feeble effort by South, with a four-loser hand and a known club fit with partner.

When South bid 4♣, for some pairs this is now RKCB in clubs. The response is steps - 4♠=1 or 4, 4♥=3 or 0 etc, so here the response by North would have been 4NT for two keycards with the queen. South now still has space to investigate the grand. It is an excellent convention to play as it avoids getting too high as you frequently can do if you have to bid 4NT asking for keycards. (Some players who play 1430 responses to 4NT, opt to play 3041 when clubs are trumps in case the reply is zero).


In this auction I am not sure what 4♦ is, maybe a psychic cue-bid to discourage a diamond lead





(nor what 5♦ was), but it had the desired effect and South bid six and a 13 IMP swing to Stonecutter.



Five Clubs made with an overtrick and +650 against 3♥-1, and the match was equalised with 12 IMPs to Stonecutter. It is only a club lead that can hold the contract to 11 tricks.

An uncontested auction took N/S to 6♠.

South could have tried asking for kings after partner's 5♥ reply to RKCB. All too often players seem to just forget to do this. If North had held the ♥K and ♣K then the grand is cold. However, luckily for them this was not the case and the ♣K was offside.

In the other room, the power of the pre-empt earnt its bacon again making life difficult for their opponents and keeping them out of the slam. 13 IMPs to Stonecutter.

There was a further swing of 7 IMPs to Tolle on the next board to close the gap, when East/ West tried 5♦ which went two down in the Open Room and their counterparts in the Closed Room stopped in 3♦.

The remaining 4 boards were completely flat. Final score Tolle 19, Stonecutter 26 - 7,23 - 12,77 VPs






# **The Name Game**

There was no explanation for South's  $2\clubsuit$ , but whatever message it conveyed it was enough for North to jump to game.


East led the ♠J for the king and ace and duumy's queen took the return of the ♥10 as declarer pitched a club. A diamond saw West take the ace and play the ♠5, declarer ruffing with the jack, West overruffing and exiting with a diamond, declarer soon claiming ten tricks, +420.

South was not worth a jump to 3♥, but North might have made a try with 3♦. After West had taken trick one with the ♠A he switched to the ♥5. When declarer played the two East won and returned a heart, holding declarer to nine tricks, +140 and a 7 IMP swing.



East led the ♥6 and West took three tricks in the suit before switching to the ♠3. East won with the queen and returned the ♣J, West taking the ace and continuing with the ♥9. North ruffed, but was booked for three down, -800 and an 11 IMP loss.

South led the ◆J and North allowed declarer to win with the queen. Declarer continued with a diamond to the nine and North won and switched to the ♣4, South winning with the nine and returning the three to declarer's ten. South took the ♥J with the ace and played the ♣J and declarer won and could have cashed out for nine tricks. However, a heart to the queen was followed by a spade for the queen and king and as declarer had failed to unblock dummy's ◆6 at trick one (!) there were only eight tricks, -100.



South led the ♣Q and declarer ducked. When South continued with the ♣3 declarer won, and played two rounds of diamonds, North winning with the king and switching to the ♠5 for the nine, ten and ace. What happened after that is far from clear, but declarer did score nine tricks, +600 and another 12 IMPs.

There are various ways to make 3NT.

After a diamond lead, North winning at some point and switching to a club, South wins and can exit with a diamond. Declarer wins in dummy and forces out the ♥A, South returning a heart. Now declarer cashes the winners in hearts and clubs before exiting with a club to endplay South into leading into the split spade tenace.







# A Tal Tale

I had the great pleasure of meeting the Tal family from Israel today, playing as Team Tal in the Open Teams. The family comprises of the two parents, Haim and Livi, and their daughters, Noga and Dana.

Noga and Dana came to Madeira earlier this year in June to play in the European Championships for the Israeli women's team (where they won a Bronze medal). They fell in love with the place, as many of us do, and decided to bring their parents here, even though it clashes slightly with the Red Sea Bridge Festival in Eilat (note to organisers - try and avoid this in the future - such events are few and far between nowadays). In fact, Haim is here celebrating his 70<sup>th</sup> birthday, although it was somewhat delayed due to covid and he is now almost 71!

So how did the entire family come to play bridge? Haim learnt in the army, and Livi's parents played so she learnt from them. When they met and married, they decided that they would continue to play together. And once their two daughters were old enough to make up a four, they

taught them to play as well, at the tender ages of nine and six. They lived in New York at this time and the children played at the bridge club there when their feet dangled off their chairs, not able to touch the floor.

Haim taught the children his very own system initially, appropriately called 'Prophet' (he had seen the light). The girls progressed to play at School and Junior level and the top Israeli players took them under their wing when much to Haim's regret, they stopped playing 'Prophet'. However, it has clearly stood them in good stead as they have played for the Israeli Womens team for some years and, did I mention, won the Bronze medal in June this year.

The family rarely play together as a team, so this is indeed a special occasion. They tell me that they all love Madeira and our Bridge Festival. Everything is perfect, even the weather (I have to agree with all that). I hope they will come back and visit us again next year.




# **Waiting To Be Made**

Polish/Franco Chess Grandmaster Savielly Tartakower coined the phrase, the Mistakes are all there, waiting to be made. I wonder what he would have made of these deals from the opening match of day 2 between Team Nuno Matos and Ponks?

South led the ◆K and declarer ruffed, went to dummy with the ♣K and played a heart for the two and king. A second heart saw North win and continue with the ace and queen, but declarer could ruff high and claim, +400.

To defeat  $5 \clubsuit$  North must rise with the  $\P$ A and continue with the queen, not easy, but certainly not impossible.



spade to the king was followed by a diamond ruff and a club to the queen, but North ruffed, and cashed the •A, -300 and 12 IMPs.

There is a good case for South to pass 3NT.

West led the ◆4 and declarer won with the ace, drew trumps ending in dummy, East discarding the ♣2, and played the ♣5 for the three and ace. When West discarded, declarer cashed the ◆K pitching a heart, played a heart to the queen and ace, ruffed the diamond return, cashed the ♠Q and played a heart to the ten and jack, -50.

Once West discarded on the first round of clubs declarer could have eliminated the diamonds and then played the ♥Q. East wins and plays a heart, but declarer takes the king, ruffs a heart and exits with a low club to endplay East.

As the play went, declarer could still have followed this line once East did not return a heart when in with the ace. That ruins declarer's timing.








# Love Boat







Both teams stopped out of a slam that was cold if trumps broke 2-2 and otherwise depended on locating the  $\P$ Q, Don Julio winning 22-20.







# Your Directors



**José Júlio Curado – co-Chief Tournament Director**: In October 1996 I decided I wanted to know the Laws of Bridge. Two years later I was invited to direct the first edition of this tournament with Rui Marques. I liked it so much that I kept coming back and in 2005 I moved to Madeira. By the end of this 12-day week, you will understand why. Have Fun!

**Marc van Beijsterveldt**: 62 years old and this year directing in my 7<sup>th</sup> festival. Ever since my first time in Madeira it has been my favourite bridge festival. I have directed all over the world and they all have their plusses and minuses, but Madeira is exceptional. Apart from directing since 1994 in world and European championships and festivals, since 1991 I work at the Dutch Bridge Federation, where I organise the national competitions for teams and pairs, and the 'Ruitenboertoernooi' simultaneous tournament that once had more than 17,000 pairs. Furthermore I support TeamNL in organising their travelling and hotels etc.





Hans van Staveren: Apart from being a TD I do many other things in the bridge world, mainly computer and network related. I am present at all major EBL and WBF championships. I am also known for the de-facto standard dealing program BigDeal and various other programs doing movements, seeding and some other stuff which most players find extremely boring. It is a lousy job, but someone has got to do it. I have been to Madeira many times, my guess is ten times or so, and I like it very much. Great atmosphere, great weather, well organized tournament.

**Jacob Duschek:** is a Danish tournament director living in Copenhagen. He was awarded the EBL Tournament Director title in 2013 and has been directing regularly at EBL Championships since then. He is the author of the textbook 'A Guide to the Bridge Laws'. His best results as a player are a bronze medal in 2011 and a silver medal in 2012 at the Danish teams championship. When not directing or writing about the bridge laws, he works full-time as a software developer in the pension industry. He has a son (22) and twin daughters (19).





**Sarah Amos:** I began my TD career in Wales where I am a National Director and still run many events. I subsequently joined the EBU TD panel over 20 years ago which has allowed me to work all over the UK, running all types of bridge events from club games to home internationals. I love the variety that directing brings me, along with the chance to meet a huge range of different personalities and levels of bridge player.

I have two beautiful daughters, Ruth who lives and works in Shetland and Rachel who teaches bridge online and would make a very fine Tournament Director.

**Diarmuid Reddan:** Diarmuid Reddan is an Irish Tournament Director recently promoted to NBO International Director and also directed at the European's in Dublin in 2012.

Diarmuid has also represented The CBAI playing in the Camrose in 2013 and has been NPC to various Irish teams with his most recent one being the Irish Mixed Team in Madeira in June this year.
