Some partnerships play that North can bid 4♦ over 4♣, as Last Train, showing slam interest without necessarily having a diamond control. It would have worked well here.

Declarer easily collected 12 tricks, +480.

5♣ promised a control in both minors and was enough for North to jump to slam, +980 and 11 IMPs.

On the surface 6♥ depends on one of the diamond honours being onside, but declarer gave

himself an extra chance by cashing the top spades at an early stage. He could then take advantage of the friendly lie in the suit to establish a third trick by ruffing a spade.

South led the ♠7 and declarer won with dummy's jack, cashed the ♠A and then played the ♣K. When both defenders followed with a small card declarer continued with the ♣3 and claimed.

Imagine South had played the ♣9 on the first round of the suit? If that is a singleton it means North started with ♣J542 and playing a low club to the ace will now be fatal in terms of scoring four club tricks.

This is a well-known situation and one way that (sometimes) avoids the problem is for declarer to start the suit by leading a low club from the ace to four. That way South might be reluctant to play the nine in case partner has the singleton ten. It would not have been an issue here, with the ten on view in dummy!

By chance we know that elsewhere Anne Gladiator saw South drop the ♦9 but did not fall into the trap. Has she done so the diamond king would



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have come to her rescue!

Here declarer started clubs by playing low to the ace, so dropping the nine would only have given him an anxious moment for a second.

East led the ♣4 for the jack, queen and ace and declarer crossed to dummy with a diamond and ran the ♠10, East winning with the queen and returning a diamond. There was now no chance of more than nine tricks, -50.

To make 4♠ declarer must put up the ♠K. When it holds, declarer plays a club to the ten and a heart and will have no trouble coming to ten tricks.

The thing to appreciate is that if East has

something like ♠AJ5, you are never going to make the contract, as after winning the first round of spades a diamond return (amongst others) will leave you with too much to do.

Some partnerships use a redouble in this situation to show a strong balanced hand (5332) so that bidding a new suit tends to suggest an unbalanced hand, usually with a shortage.

East led the ♠J, West taking the ace and switching to hearts. Declarer won the second round of the suit and played to ruff clubs in dummy, easily recording 10 tricks for +170 and 6 IMPs that gave Resi an important 24-10 win.



Size Is Not Important

Bridge writers are not usually attracted by low-level contracts. Not least because they frequently contain many potential twists and turns that can be hard to analyse with limited time at one's disposal.

However, they can contain instructive points, as for example, this deal from Round 5 of the teams:

declarer is likely to lose a spade, three trumps, a diamond and a club.

East led the ♠3 and West took the ace and switched to the ♦7, East winning with the ace and returning the ♦2 to dummy's queen. Declarer cashed dummy's top spades, discarding a club and a diamond and then ruffed a spade before cashing the ♦K and playing a club to the king followed by the ♣Q, East taking the ace. These cards remained:

Whatever East did next, West could only score two trump tricks.

How did Flemming Bøgh Sørensen appreciate that it was best to leave the trump suit well alone? The clue came from West's double, suggesting that he would be short in clubs. If East had also appreciated that, an initial club lead would have set up an unavoidable ruff to defeat the contract.

Looking briefly at all four hands it appears that

The Kaplan-Rubens Hand Evaluator rates the East hand at only 11.3 (hardly surprising with such a poor suit and weak intermediates) and West at 11 points. Despite that, only 11 pairs managed to stop in 2♥, while 23 were in 3♥ and 37 in 4♥. Meanwhile there were 3 in 1NT, 2 in 2NT and 17 in 3NT. (6 pairs made a game! Editors)



Hamman Slams

There is an expression in the bridge world of a ‘Hamman Slam’, Bob Hamman’s definition of a good slam is one that makes. In the set of eight boards we had five Hamman slams.

Idly watching Round 7 of the Open Teams Board 2 passed before me and I saw the auction reach the dizzy heights of Six Spades after North had tried to pre-empt in clubs. After the lead of the ♣5 declarer played low from dummy and was quickly down when North won the trick and gave partner a club ruff. The full hand was as follows:

When it walks like a singleton, looks like a singleton and quacks like a singleton then it probably is a singleton, so we must rise with the club ace to avoid immediate defeat. The hand records say that Six Spades can be made and our quest now is to find out how to do it. We have to decide who has the ♥K and play accordingly. Let us assume that we are going to play South for the card (as per the diagram), then we draw trumps and cash the ace of hearts and lead a low one towards the table and when South takes the king we have two discards for our losing clubs. We are about to table our cards when we notice that South withheld the king while North discards. That still leaves us with two losing clubs. We are not without resource, we immediately duck a heart to South and now we have the classic elements of a double squeeze: North guards the clubs and South guards the hearts so they both cannot guard the diamonds. So we win the diamond return and run trumps to reach this ending:

Now when we cash the last trump South must discard a diamond and so dummy's heart is jettisoned and North is squeezed in the minors. Six Spades made, well played Mr Hamman.

When West opened with 1♦ North showed the majors. Following an ‘incident’ in the bidding you have arrived in 7NT from the West hand. The lead is the ♠Q and Mr Hamman is on your shoulder, smiling, so you know that the contract is certain – but how – certainly a lot of finesses are going to have to work. Assuming diamonds come in for five tricks, the heart finesse succeeds, along with the club finesse we are up to a total of twelve tricks which is one short.

The lead should be taken in dummy - we will need that ♠Ax later as a menace. We might as well get the finesses out of the way before we arrive at the denouement so after a successful club finesse we are then happy to see that the



diamonds have not sprung a leak. The king of hearts and another successful finesse see us riding our luck to the limit. There is a glimmer of hope as it seems that North might guard the hearts and South the clubs whilst both have some control in the spades. There is the look of a double squeeze again, but this time the menaces are slightly differently placed. Before we run the diamonds we cash the ace of clubs and before the last diamond is cashed the layout is as follows:

When we cash the last diamond South lets go a club and North must keep two hearts and so discards a spade. The ace of hearts now squeezes South in the black suits and you can now proudly boast you have just made 7NT on a non-simultaneous double squeeze.

The session continues in a similar vein, on Board 4 you can make a slam if you drop the doubleton trump queen offside. On Board 6 a slam can be made if you finesse against the ♣QJ and finally on Board 7 there is yet a fifth Hamman slam where you need to play trumps as AJxxx opposite 10xxx for one loser and make some excellent decisions as to which successful finesses to take.

A good day in the office for Bob.

Let me ask you how would you play this hand?

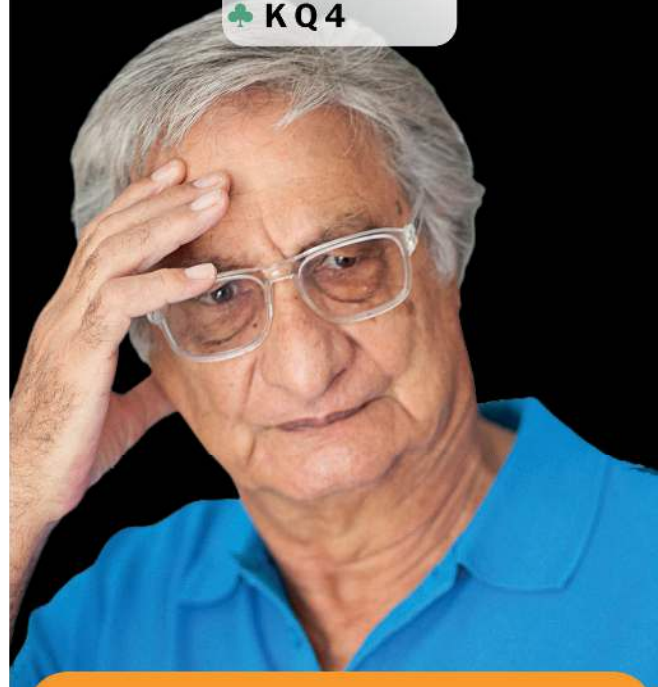

The Muiderberg Double

Aris Verburgh came to the Bulletin Room to present me with this hand.

Put yourself in West's place for a moment. He heard his RHO bid all of his suits, 3♣ from South was made after some long thinking so, when the 3NT bid from North came around to him, Janssens (aged 81 and nicknamed The Grumpy Old Man, and inventor of the Muiderberg convention) doubled even though he had only 7 HCP.

After ♦2 lead, declarer never attacked the spades assuming from the double that they would behave badly and the contract plummeted three down for -500.

So here is an entry for the best bid, or if you like the best sniff (as something fishy was up), which came from Aris Verburgh who nominated his partner Onno Janssens. Janssens thought his double was the best bid he had made in his 60 odd year bridge career.

Did you get it right?

Let me tell you how you should have played it...

We have:

1 trick in ♠
3 tricks in ♥
0 tricks in ♦
3 tricks in ♣

We can get at least 2 tricks in ♦ by knocking the ♦ A. Our only worry should be how to avoid losing 4 tricks in ♠ along with ♦ A.

To lose 4 tricks in ♠, the suit needs to be 5-2. This is not impossible, West led ♠4, which can be from xxx42. We should notice our 10965 in hand which can be very helpful. If we play low from hand and East wins the trick with any of K/Q/J and plays back a low ♠, the contract depends on who's got the ♦ A. Instead, if we win the lead with the ♠A and East started with Kx/Qx/Jx the opponents don't have any good options. Whoever has the ♦ A will win it but the ♠ are blocked. Our 109x are a stopper. Therefore, we should rise with the ♠A, securing the contract except if creative West decided to lead low from KQJ42.
