The Presidents Win Open Teams

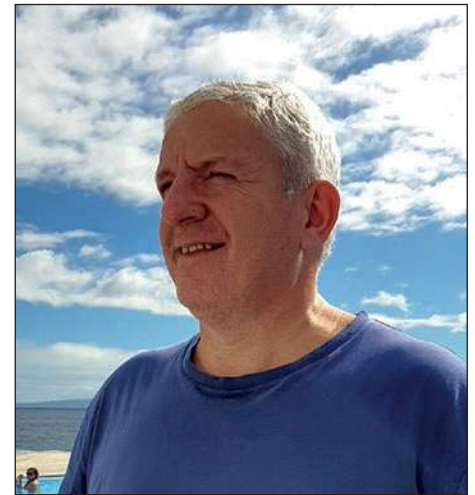
Here we are yet again saying goodbye after another successful event, the 26th Madeira International Bridge Open.

Opportunities, Good Bad and Indifferent

Here is an all too brief review of some of the play on the *Longest Day*.

This deal from Round 4 is instructive.

If West is able to open 2♥ to show that suit and a minor and North risks a 2♠ overcall South is sure to bid game.

If West does not open and North tries a third in hand 1♠ it would be a brave East who overcalls 2♥ on that moth eaten suit. If East does pass South could bid 3♣ to show a maximum pass with four-card spade support, or bid 2NT to show a maximum-four card raise. Clearly 3♣ is best, as it will encourage North to bid 4♠.

This deal from Round 5 is a potential death trap for N/S.

Without going into details, I heard of one match where the teams traded four figure penalties.

With two aces and a void North might be best to pass, but with no majors a preemptive 3♦ has some appeal (unless you have an opening bid that promises both minors).

If 3♦ is followed by two passes should West try a speculative 3NT?

For the big deal in Round 8 we pay a visit to the top of the table clash between Nuno Matos and Cole:

That conventional looking sequence saw East lead the ♦A, declarer playing to ruff two diamonds for +1370.




Maximum Pressure

While I was looking at yesterday's deals this morning, I tuned in to the International Championship Snooker Final between Tom Ford and Zhang Anda. With the score at 1-1 in the best of 19 frame final, the Chinese player produced a flawless display of potting in compiling a maximum 147 break, to the delight of the home crowd.

That leads us neatly to the deal of the tournament, which occurred in the final match of the day:

North's whimsical overcall suggested bad breaks might be possible, so not wanting to risk a possible ruff at trick one West decides to play in no-trumps.

When North leads the ♥Q, declarer wins with the king, unblocks the ♠AJ and then cashes the ♥A and the ♣K before crossing to dummy with a club. When North discards on this trick, declarer can lay his cards on the table!

As dummy's remaining spades are cashed, South, compelled to keep two clubs, is forced to come down to the ♦Q10 and ♣J10.

On the last spade declarer discards the ♣8, comes to hand with the ♦K and cashes the ♣Q. North, down to ♥J ♦J32 is forced to part with a diamond and so declarer's 13th trick materializes in the guise of the ♦7.

A text-book non-simultaneous double squeeze.

These things look easy on paper, but in real life things are not so simple. If declarer does not cash the ♣K it is possible to misguess the ending, playing for the clubs to be 3-3.

Many who attempted 7NT failed to record a maximum!

Don't ask me how I misplayed the hand.

Addendum Ed.

Two players made 7NT, the first was presented with the contract when North led a small heart, the second was Agustin Madala who received the lead of the queen of hearts and he now executed the non-simultaneous double squeeze as outlined above - bravo.



On Or Off?

System On or System Off? That is the Question

Most likely some of you will have some agreements in all kinds of situations in bridge. Both in play and in bidding. Some of you might have a convention card (brief or extensive), some might have some system notes and some even might have a system book (somewhere between 10 and 199 pages).

When making agreements I think – depending on your level and/or ambitions – it is a smart thing to base agreements on four starting points:

1. They are memorable (logical)
2. They are consistent (bids are the same in similar situations)
3. They are useful (e.g. transfers)
4. They are frequent (the situation occurs every week)

These are quite useful starting points and fairly easy to work with. However, in some situations you might want to have some other agreements. That is where point two comes into jeopardy.

For example; after a 1NT overcall many will play system on: 2♣ Stayman, 2♦/♥ transfers and so on.

1. (1m) – 1NT – (Pass) - ?
2. (1m) – Pass – (Pass) – 1NT (Pass) - ?

These situations look very much alike and one could play system on in both situations. But

In situation one it could be better to play system off and in situation two it is better to play system on. Why? To force the ‘strong’ hand to lead. Theorists say that – in the long run – this delivers you more than half a trick. If you don’t like that idea or think it’s too much of an attack on the brain, don’t bother.

Some more examples:

3. (1NT) - ?
4. (1NT) – Pass – Pass - ?

What to bid? Some of you will have the same agreements in 2nd and 4th seat. Although I have my own favourites, I am not going to discuss here whether it is better to play Multi Landy or Multi

defence or DONT or Suction or Cappelletti or Lionel or Aspro or even natural. But I think it is – slightly better to have different agreements in the two different positions. I think we all agree that we fight a rearguard battle if we let them play in 1NT, for sure in matchpoints scoring but even sometimes in IMPs. So we want to get into the auction and in that case it is good to have an agreement (about shape, about strength or about ‘losers’).

Let’s look at example three. Left hand opponent opens 1NT and partner could not interfere. You play Multi Landy and you hold:

♠ 3
♥ KJ42
♦ AQJ104
♣ J75

Alas, in your system you cannot bid anything either, unless (this really happened) you claim that there was a diamond between your hearts (and bid 2♥). What would you want partner to lead? And what do you think partner will lead?. Most likely he/she will lead a (small) spade. That will cost a trick (or two) and more, it will cost precious tempo.

The solution? Play natural in the 4th seat, possibly supplemented with some special bids for two-suiters (i.e. 2♣ for the majors).

Variable No-Trump

At some level pairs play varying no-trumps: 15-17, 12-14 and 9-11. Which one to choose is dependent on the vulnerability at the table. After a strong no-trump I think it is most agreeable to play things like Stayman and transfers. After a weak no-trump however, I would strongly recommend to skip the transfers and bid a natural 2♥/♠ and 3♣/♦, both non-forcing. Transfers here give the opponents too many chances to come back in to the auction. The one time out of 250 that you have a strong hand with a five card Major you could try 2♦ (Murray). What to do with the middle range (12-14) is for yourself to decide.

Next year I will dive into the matter of adjusting agreements depending on the type of tournament (pairs, teams, board-a-match or patton).



Open Teams

This board passed our way in the 1st session of the Open Teams on Friday night.

At our table the bidding went :

Never one to knowingly shy away from a slam, we arrived in 6NT.

North did not oblige with a spade lead and instead found the lead of the ♣K. Now when the diamonds did not behave themselves the contract went one off.

At the other table, West did not respond 1♥ but remarkably bid 2♣. This now shut North up from making a revolting spade overcall and furthermore, stopped South from leading a club against 6♦. Instead, he led a heart, and when declarer inserted the ♥10 and it held, he now had three discards for his losing spades on the ♥AK and the ♣A, losing just the queen of trumps.

So many times the lead gives away a contract. A book on opening leads is definitely on my Christmas list.

In the same match, my partner (the lovely John Linse) made life difficult for the opponents on board 21, but to no avail:

5♦ as you can see goes one off. I have spoken in an earlier bulletin of the power of the pre-empt – in this case it puts immense pressure on N/S to make the right decision – I wonder how many felt compelled to bid a non-making 5♥ (4♥ makes as you can set up your spades despite West’s fine holding, losing a diamond, and two spades).

At the other table, East bid a feeble 2NT – I much prefer 4NT with a 6-6 hand which has no defence to anything (except diamonds 😊😊😊) and now N/S have more room to find out more information before doubling 5♦ for a flat board.
