

The first of twelve rounds of the Open Teams and one of the first matches on VuGraph was de Botton taking on Adamant. The first board was a potential slam but neither side bid it so it was a flat board.


When North declined to continue after his partner's One Spade bid East could find no sensible way into the auction. Declarer soon recorded eight tricks.

At this table North's courtesy raise allowed West to make a light protective Double. This left East with a dilemma and he chose to defend rather than make a bid. As the cards lie 2NT would make, everything is well-placed even down to the doubleton ♥9 8. Now he had to defend and prove his decision correct. West led the jack of spades which declarer took in dummy. Declarer tried a small diamond to the jack and queen and the suit was continued to East's ace. West took his gueen of clubs when East switched to the \$8, and exited


with a diamond. Declarer played a heart to the king; East took it with his ace and played a club. This allowed declarer to cross ruff and end with this position, with the lead in dummy:



Now when the heart was led from dummy East would only make one trick, if he ruffed low the ♠9 would win if he ruffed high then he would have to lead away from his tenace.

My finessing friend tells me that the contract can be defeated so where did the defence deviate? It was the play of the ace of hearts. If it is ducked the timing is wrong for the endplay and declarer is not in dummy at trick eleven. 8 IMPs to Adamant.


The opening lead of the jack of diamonds was taken by the king and declarer then cashed two top hearts and correctly unblocked the ♥10. Now the 4-1 heart split was no longer a problem as any possible blockages in the majors had been nullified.

To make the contract declarer has to finesse against the four hearts in the North hand but he has no valid reason so to do. 10 IMPs to Adamant.

Adamant stayed out of a slam which basically hinges on a favourable split in the trump suit, On this occasion it was the right decision.

East knew of the diamond shortage in his partner's hand and maybe this, along with suspecting the team needed a swing, encouraged East to bid the slam. Not his lucky day and 11 IMPs to Adamant who had won the encounter 30-3.



East's enthusiastic approach to the bidding resulted in a dubious game being reached.

However, when North led the ♣Q declarer was in with a shout.

He took the top clubs discarding diamonds from dummy, and noting South's $\clubsuit 10.8$, continued with the $\clubsuit 6$, discarding dummy's remaining diamond.

South could ruff and exit with a spade, but declarer could win with the \clubsuit J, ruff a diamond, come to hand with the \blacktriangledown K, ruff a diamond, cash the \blacktriangledown A, ruff a heart and exit with a diamond, discarding dummy's last heart. When North continued with the \clubsuit J, South, who had parted with the \blacktriangledown Q on the previous trick, was forced to ruff and lead into dummy's \spadesuit K10.

Age is No Barrier

Yesterday, while covering Session 1 of the teams on VuGraph, I stumbled upon a partnership that made me do a double take. Not because of their bidding style, but because of their birth certificates. Meet Thordur Sigurdsson of Iceland (76) and Avery Silverstein of the USA (17) – a duo with nearly 60 years between them. If there were a prize for 'Largest age gap at the table,' I'd say they're strong contenders.

So how did this unlikely pair come to be? Picture it: Avery, a New Yorker, gets a call from a friend insisting she *must* come to Madeira because the bridge festival is simply too good to miss. She agrees – on one condition: "Find me a team." Cue Thordur's entrance, stage right. The two had never played together before, but from the looks of it, they're having a blast.

Now, let's pause to appreciate Avery's travel résumé. At just 17, she flew solo across the Atlantic to get here. Not exactly a direct hop either – her journey included a seven-hour layover in Oporto. But Avery is no stranger to globe-trotting alone. Take the World Youth Championships in Salsomaggiore: Avery's return trip involved three trains, a cancelled flight, and a whole lot of patience. She has probably logged more solo miles than most of us will in a lifetime.

And that's the beauty of bridge. At the table, age, background, and even travel horror stories fade away. What's left is the game itself – an equalizer that unites a teenager from New York and a septuagenarian from Iceland in perfect partnership.

How good is that?

What's in the Daily News?

The same four players in first, second and third spots in the Open Teams – they're clearly finding it impossible to lose –



I speak from experience when I say that playing in a tournament for which you're also writing and editing the Bulletin is not among the world's leading sinecures, and my admiration for the people who daily (and often nightly) perform the task knows no bounds. Every so often, however...

Open Pairs, session 3.

Board 2. Dealer East. N/S Vul.




One declarer in 4♥ is reported to have ruffed the second spade, drawn trumps, ruffed a third spade, cashed two clubs and played ◆A and another with the observation that 'there are many possibilities for an endplay but none of them actually work on this hand'. I wish that North at my table had shared his view – instead of playing ◆A and another he simply led a low diamond to the eight and claimed eleven tricks on the resulting endplay. I suppose if I'd put in ◆10 as I should have done he might have played me for ◆J10 doubleton, but I doubt he had actually come so far to fall at the final hurdle.

The Open Teams started with a gain of a couple of IMPs to our side for reaching a superior inferior slam.

Open Teams. Round 1.

Board 1. Dealer North. None Vul.



With the North cards I was able to deploy our secret weapon – a $1 \clubsuit$ opening bid that shows length in clubs. South bid $1 \blacktriangledown$ and West a restrained $2 \spadesuit$, allowing me to use what I imagined would be a clear splinter with $4 \spadesuit$. East passed and partner started thinking.

This was alarming, because although I had intended to bid on over 4♥ if partner produced it in tempo (♥KQxx and nothing else would give play for a slam) the position was not so clear that I could in all conscience bid over a slow 4♥. Fortunately partner produced 4♠, so I bid 4NT. Readers will by now have forgotten that on the first day of the Pairs I had not known what kind of Blackwood we played, but we had sorted it out by now and I 'knew' that her 5♦ response showed one key card, so I bid 6♥.

West cashed ◆A and shifted to a club, which partner won in hand with ♣10, She picked up




the trumps and claimed the rest, leaving me somewhat perplexed. It later transpired that 4♠ was based on what philosophers call the Argument from Personal Incredulity – unable to believe that I had a singleton diamond when she had one herself, partner ascribed to 4♠ a variety of possible alternative meanings and bid 4♠ in case spades was one of them. The 5♠ response to Blackwood showed a key card not in hearts but in spades, thus we achieved the rare feat of bidding a slam on the trump finesse after using RKCB – you can't usually do that because the missing trump king might instead be an actual ace.

At the other table the auction started with the same three calls, but our West bid $5 \spadesuit$ over $1 \blacktriangledown$. Undaunted their North, whose clubs in his methods might have been 53 doubleton, bid $6 \clubsuit$ because they were rather better than that, and everyone passed. I can't help thinking that this courageous effort deserved a rather better fate than a 2 IMP loss.

Monitoring of the success rate of Burn's Law continues, with a rare counter-example being




At our table South's opening 1♣ was greeted by a 3♥ overcall from West that rather defied the typical characteristics of a pre-empt – decent suit, little outside. Her partner judged well to pass, and the defence took the obvious four tricks. East-West can in fact make three different game contracts – 3NT and 5♦ each score 400 on best defence, but the optimum result is to be obtained by having fewer trumps than the opponents and collecting 420 in 4♠. If anyone managed that, please don't tell me how – it would be a shame to have the Law relegated to the status of a mere guideline.

An Unexpected Ruff

On this deal from the second session of the Open Pairs, Pony Nehmert and Christian Fröhner (who teach bridge in Wiesbaden, Germany) produced a defence that bamboozled declarer:

West led the ♣7 and East played the ♣A (a subtle suit preference signal for hearts) followed by the ♣K, ruffed and overruffed by West who switched to the ♥9, for the ♥Q, king and ace. The ♠A saw East drop the ♠Q and when declarer played a low diamond West took the ♦K and returned the suit, East ruffing dummy's ♠Q and continuing with the ♣J. Declarer ruffed high, West discarding a heart. A spade to the ten was followed by a diamond, Declarer allowing West to win with the ♣J. The heart return allowed East to cash two tricks in the suit and play a club, ensuring that West's ♠8 would win a trick, giving the defenders eight in all.

Note that although West held five diamonds, he managed to score a ruff in the suit.

This was a bad result but might still be a winning play.


