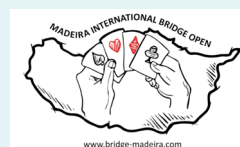

There were some deals which at first sight might not seem to be of interest.

Herman Klouwen came and told me how he and his partner Aris Verburgh had a defence against Three Hearts on this deal. The opening lead was the ♣9 and when declarer played the queen Herman ducked. This gave declarer the impression that West had led from K1092 as their leads were 3rd and 5th. Declarer now cashed two top trumps and led a club towards dummy. The ♣8 lost to the ♣10. Now a diamond through declarer's king saw Aris take two diamond tricks and exit in the suit. Declarer could get out for one down but tried a spade to the king and was now down three.

By a country mile the most frequent contract was 3NT but at eight tables only a part-score was reached and at another a makeable Four Spades

failed on a club lead. The fate of the contract was often in the hands of the opening lead. When East started with an opening bid of 1NT the lead was often a diamond, giving declarer the opportunity of twelve tricks; 20 declarers took such advantage whereas about 30 only made eleven tricks. If East started with an opening bid of One Diamond then a club lead became more frequent. More than 60 times a club was led and declarer failed about 50% of the time. The table I watched on VuGraph got a club lead. Declarer took the second round, and then cashed the ace of diamonds and saw the ♦10 appear from North and promptly finessed against South's jack to bring home the contract. I have no input as to whether this was the main reason those who suffered a club lead were able to bring home their contract.

On this board there was one positive score for N/S when somehow they played in 2♥ just making. 37 pairs bid and made a small slam in the minors. 13 pairs found the sacrifice in Six Spades and another bid the top of 6NT (played by East, but not actually necessary, except for the blood pressure). There was a plethora of multi Two Diamond openers and this was my favourite auction.

North's Four Clubs was asking opening to bid his major (maybe by transfer) but there was no chance as East directly employed Blackwood and now North had the chance for glory for making a 'pass or correct' bid at the six-level. If you have made a 'pass or correct' bid at the seven-level let me know.

Whilst Four Spades can be made it will require exceptional card reading or an error from the defence. Only 22 out of 150 declarers succeeded. Those 14 pairs who managed to play in 3NT were rewarded as they will virtually always make the contract, especially if the opening lead is a heart from East (all but two of them). Had East had an extra spade and West an extra diamond, Four Spades is less difficult and in certain lines of play East gets squeezed in three suits – the reader is invited to crack open our finessing friend to try it out.

'Do you want to hear about the luckiest hand ever?' I was asked between matches on Saturday.

Apparently North responded 2♠ to partner's opening 2♣, which seemed reasonable if a little short on high-card strength. But appearances can be deceptive, for North had a near-maximum in his methods – 2♠ apparently showed 4-7 points, regardless of distribution.

South picked an auspicious moment to forget this – thinking partner had a normal positive in spades, she agreed that suit and bid a slam in it. As you can see, there were no problems in the play and our heroes chalked up 1430.

'You think you were lucky?' I asked him. 'At my table partner opened 2♣ and I bid 2♦. Partner bid 3♥, which technically showed a solid suit and asked me to show any ace. I bid 3♠ and when partner bid 4♣ I thought I had a little too much to sign off in 4♥, so I bid 5♥ and partner added a sixth.

'When I put the dummy down, partner thanked me politely as usual and began thinking. At length, she asked me why I had transferred to hearts rather than spades. Now I knew what had happened – thinking she had already shown a strong balanced hand via 2♣-2♦-2NT and conscious that I had bid diamonds, she had completed the second stage of the transfer routine without the precaution of completing the first.

'Six hearts, of course, was just as cold as six spades or six no trumps since the trump suit proved to be solid enough for practical purposes. It was not as good a contract, because while 6NT is worth bidding and 6♠ is OK, 6♥ is distinctly poor.'

'Doesn't 6NT need the same luck as 6♥?' someone asked later at dinner. Not really, for if the spades run (a little over 70%) you can make if the hearts are 3-3 or the hand with long hearts has the only guard in one of the minors (some reading of the ending may be required). But 6♥ has the virtue of being extremely easy to play, which when you consider the way it was bid is no bad thing.

West opened a strong No Trump, and if East had made what looks like a routine raise to 3NT I would have led a diamond. Partner would have continued the suit, declarer would have no particular reason to get the clubs right, and we would have beaten the contract by about three.

Of course, none of this happened. East bid 2♠, a transfer to clubs, and South doubled it. Now East passed West's 3♣ round to South, who might have reopened with 3♦ but chose 3♠ instead. Now East bid 3NT, so of course I led a spade and although declarer lost a club he made the contract easily enough.

After a more or less routine transfer auction my partner played 4♠ from the South seat on a heart lead. She won it, cashed ♠A, and led a club. Developments now became what I would in earlier times have described as surreal, but by this stage of the week were roughly par for the course. West played ♣Q on this trick, covered by the king and

ace. East continued clubs, South ruffing the third round.

Declarer played a heart to the king and a diamond to the jack and West's queen. Since ♣9 was now a winner West led a fourth round of the suit in an attempt to kill it, but South over-ruffed East, ruffed a diamond, drew trumps and claimed. A small quiz: estimate the number of IMPs our side gained for these manoeuvres.

The answer is five, but only in a manner of speaking. You see, at the other table West had overcalled the 1NT opening with 2NT to show the minors. East thus had the dubious pleasure of declaring 3♣ doubled, and the 1100 penalty meant that our 620 lost 10 IMPs rather than 15 had we been minus 100. As James Thurber so eloquently put it, although he was not writing about bridge:

Ashes to ashes, and clay to clay –
If the enemy don't get you, your own folks may.

Thanks Miguel, thanks Madeira. See you next year.

Young Dogs and New Tricks

As a newly-minted OAP (Old Age Pensioner) I had the pleasure of playing in the Warm-Up Pairs with a German Junior International (masquerading as a Frenchman, for some reason). Your Bulletin staff met Ole Farwig last year, when his intended partner had cancelled, and were delighted not only to arrange several different pretty good partners for him but also to drag him along for dinner every night. This year he had a proper partner but was casting around for someone for the Warm-Up pairs, and I was lucky enough to be available.

Ole's name is of interest to me, because in my teens I lived around the corner from a street called Farwig Lane. It turned out that the Johann Farwig, a member of a notable metal-working family in Southwark, who had acquired and built on the land in the late 18th century, and by whose name the area had been known, was in fact an ancestor of Ole's. The Farwig Lane of the 1970s was an ugly little street significant only for containing a pub called – with little originality – the Farwig, and for the Russell & Bromley shoe factory.

In true Junior fashion we did quite a lot of bidding and Ole did quite a lot of playing; luckily he managed to arrange to be declarer on almost all of the boards that were 'our' hands. On this board I did more bidding than I ought to have, but my faith in my partner's declarer play was fully justified:

As dealer I opened 1♣, which showed at least two clubs. Partner bid 1NT, which to someone trained on steam-driven Acol showed clubs and some points. I have, however, adapted sufficiently to a) Continental-style bidding and b) the 21st century that I recognised that my partner might have some diamonds instead.

It seemed really feeble to pass – if partner had clubs we could probably make quite a lot of them, and if he didn't, he might have quite a lot of points – up to 11. 3NT was a considerable overbid, but after I had shilly-shallied for several seconds I thought I ought to do something, so that was what I bid. Ole stoically masked his surprise at my lack of high-card points, and set about making a lot of tricks.

North led the ♠3, won by the 10 in dummy. Ole played a heart to the 10 and a club to the ace. When he saw the 10 on his left, he paused for quite a long time, presumably to try to clear the cloud of beer in which he had enveloped himself earlier in the day (he's German, and a Junior, after all). After several minutes he played a club to the 8, which held. He cashed the ♣Q and then the ace of hearts and another heart. Now he cashed the two remaining clubs and the last heart, and North was pseudo-squeezed for 12 tricks and some relief on my part.



Another of our triumphs, in which our opponents had better remain nameless, was Board 25. North-South confidently bid their way to 6NT via an auction which has in the intervening six days faded into the mist. North had at some point bid hearts, and I couldn't believe they could make the contract when I held ♥KQ975. I doubled. That was passed round to North, who retreated to 7♠, which partner had no difficulty doubling with his AQ93 of trumps, diamond guard and ♠K. 7♠ went for 800, which was only 97% of the matchpoints.

If any other charming young men, or even the same one, are on the hunt for a partner for next year's Warm-Up Pairs, you will usually find me in the Bulletin Room drinking tea and looking frazzled.

The Vanishing Trick

Although it is generally the more explosive deals that catch the eye, there is a lot to be learnt from low-level contacts. Here is a case in point from the fifth round of the teams:

West leads the ♦K and declarer ducks, wins the diamond continuation and plays a spade for the two, jack and ace. When West exits with a spade, declarer wins, ruffs a diamond and must find a way to turn three potential major suit losers into two. One option is to play West for ♥Q10/♥K10 and exit with a spade. If East exits with a club you put in the ♣10, planning eventually to play a low heart towards the jack. If West plays the king or queen you intend to play the ♥J on the next round of the suit, hopefully pinning West's ♥10.

As the cards lie that will not work, but declarer can prevail.

Having taken the ♠K declarer plays a heart from dummy, covering East's card. West wins, but the defenders cannot prevent declarer from establishing a long heart, at the same time keeping East off lead.
