New Safety Regulations

Miguel Albuquerque (Regional President) has introduced new COVID directives starting from midnight Friday 6th November.

- Restaurants will be closed at 23h00. Each table to have a maximum of 5 people unless they are all from the same household. Bars to be closed at midnight and PSP, GNR and ARAE* will reinforce these directives. In restaurants, bars etc., customers will not be allowed to remain inside after closing
- Nightclubs in Madeira will be closed for 1 month
- Gatherings of more than 5 people on public street are forbidden except if the people are all from the same household
- Ban of consumption of alcoholic beverages in public places†
- Gymnasiums will be required to reduce their capacity to 50% and measure the temperature of all users. All competitions for non-professional sports are suspended for 30 days‡
- Churches in Madeira are now limited to one third of maximum capacity
- Children older than 6 years are obliged to wear masks
- Public Transport: Capacity is reduced to 2/3 of maximum capacity
- Hairdressers and Tattoo Studios: Capacity is reduced to 50% of maximum. Prior appointment is mandatory
- Casino: Capacity is reduced to 50% of maximum
- Marine tourism: Boat capacity is reduced to 50% of maximum. Prior appointment is mandatory.
- * Polícia de Segurança Pública, Guarda Nacional Republicana, Autoridade Regional das Atividades Económicas

† This means in the street and in parks and on beaches, rather than in bars

The Usual Suspects

One of the most famous lines in the history of movies, 'Round up the usual suspects' has been used over and over again in books and films. When it comes to the Teams Championship in Madeira we always see one particular set of faces around the top of the leader board - and so far this year it is business as usual for Team Nuno Matos. Let's see how they fared in Round 6:

If he now draws the outstanding trump South is squeezed. Declarer can exit in whichever minor South discards from, ensuring a trick in the other.

However, declarer played a diamond to the nine and South won with the king and played two rounds of clubs enabling North to score the ♥9, -100.

North led the $\heartsuit J$ and declarer won with dummy's ace and set about the trump suit, South taking the second round and switching to the $\spadesuit 3$. Winning with the king, declarer played a club to the ace, ruffed a spade, cashed the $\clubsuit K$, ruffed a club, North pitching the $\spadesuit J$ and ruffed spade to reach this ending:

Once again North led the $\heartsuit J$ and declarer won with the ace. He continued with a spade and when the king won he played a club to the ace and embarked on a cross-ruff, eventually pitching a diamond on the $\spadesuit Q$ as North, who had pitched a spade, ruffed and exited with a trump, declarer claiming the two tricks he needed with the $\heartsuit KQ$ for +620 and 12 IMPs.

If declarer ruffs the ♠Q with an honour he can then ruff his last club and score an overtrick.

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If East had followed the time honoured tradition of leading partner's suit, 3NT would have been defeated, but he went with the ♣J and West won with the ace and switched to the ♠4. Declarer tried the jack and when East produced the queen declarer ducked, won the next spade with dummy's ace and played a diamond for the king and ace. Declarer cashed his diamonds before exiting with a heart. If East wins this and exits with a spade, West will take the last two tricks with the ♥K and the ♠10 for one down, but East played low and West won but had no good move. He returned a heart and East won but had to give the last two tricks to either declarer or dummy.

If declarer retains dummy's ♠J the defenders have little chance. Having won with dummy's ♠A declarer can take five rounds of diamonds, unblock the ♣Q and then exit with a heart.

Even simpler is to win the spade switch with the king, unblock the ♣Q, cross to dummy with a spade and play a diamond.

East cashed the ♥A and had only to continue the suit to be in with a chance of defeating the contract. West wins, cashes the ♣A and then plays a third heart. East can ruff that with the ♦8 and give East a club ruff.

When East switched to a spade declarer could win with the jack, cross to dummy with the ♠A, play a diamond to the queen, pitch a heart on the ♠K, ruff a heart and play a diamond for eleven tricks, still a loss of 10 IMPs.

North led the ♠8 and declarer took two rounds of the suit and then played a club to the seven and eight. South switched to the ♥K and then played the ♦9, North taking the ace and switching to the ♣5. When declarer put up dummy's ace there were ten tricks, +170.

North led the ♥A and switched to the ♣J. Declarer won with dummy's ace, drew trumps, played a diamond to the jack, ruffed a heart and played a diamond, North taking the ace exiting with a diamond. Declarer overtook dummy's queen with the king and played the ♣6, claiming ten tricks. As the cards lay he could even afford to play dummy's ♣Q as South would then have to offer up a ruff and discard. Another 10 IMPs changed hands and the usual suspects went into the last round on top of the table thanks to their 44-9 win.



Back To The Future

West led the ♦A and continued with the ten, East winning with the queen and returning the nine. West took two more tricks in the suit and declarer threw a two spades and two clubs, which was not best. West switched to the ♠K and even if declarer had divined the club position he would have had

only eight tricks. He got the suit wrong and finished four down, -400 and 11 IMPs went away.

If declarer had pitched a heart from dummy rather than a second club he could have made 3NT. West would have shown the ♠KQ and the ♦AKJ - with the ♣Q he had enough for a 1NT opening.

However, that does not excuse the bidding, which was way off-beam. 5♣ is the place to play - all declarer has to do is get the clubs right.

South led the ♦7 and North won with the king and switched to the ♥3, South winning and returning the ♥J. Declarer ruffed, ruffed a diamond and played a spade, +450.

Perhaps North, adhering to the old adage, '6-5 come alive' should have gone on to 5♥, although at this vulnerability East would probably have taken the push to 5♠.

2♥ looks a lot with West's hand, but he plays the thing! North led the ♠A and switched to the ♣7, South winning with the ace and returning the ♠2. Declarer won with the nine, drew two rounds of trumps and unblocked the ♣K. When the queen fell he could draw the last trump and claim.

Having led the ♠A, North should continue the suit, when declarer must lose four tricks. If South had calmly returned the ♣Q after winning the ace declarer would still have needed to get the diamonds right, but that would have been easy enough - South, marked with the ♠Q could not also have the ♦A as well as the ♣AO.

East led the ♥A and switched to a club West winning with the king and playing two more hearts, declarer ruffing, playing a club to the ace, a diamond to the ace and then ace of spades and a

spade to the ten and king, West exiting with a spade. Declarer ruffed that and apparently took eight tricks, although he appears to be cold for two under tricks. Even so, it represented an 11 IMP swing.

On Board 8 East held ♠762 ♥832 ♦Q8654 ♣98 and when his partner opened 1♣ Brenner responded 1♠! It was enough to keep N/S out of an excellent game that was reached in the other room for a 7 IMP swing.

West led the ♦4 and East took the ace and switched to the ♣10. Declarer won in dummy and lead a spade but East rose with the ace and the defenders cross-ruffed for two down.

On a heart lead 3NT is doomed, but East had a second string to his bow and started with the ♦9. Declarer won with the queen, played a spade to the king and a spade to the eight and ace. He won the diamond exit with dummy's king and cashed his winners, at one point slipping the ♣7 past West to finish with 10 tricks and 13 IMPs.

Once again their aggressive approach had paid huge dividends, Team Nuno Matos winning 42-22.

In the open room, East/West were allowed to play in a routine 4♠, probably bid as an advance sacrifice with the lovely 5-5 spade fit and good shape, which as it happens is cold for ten tricks. In the closed room another story unfolded- Paz was not going to let matters lie and red against green but with a shapely two-suited hand, girded his loins and made a take-out double of 4♠. This prompted a flurry of bidding the upshot of which was East/West took the push to 5♠ for one off.

Once the double by North had been made, North/South were onto a winner:

- 4♠ was making for East/West
- 5♣ or 5♥ make for North South

Paradoxically, once the double by North had been made, East/West were also sort of onto a winner by bidding 5♠ as a sacrifice over the North/South game. A win-win-win situation that unfortunately for Don Julio meant an 11 IMP swing to Team, Nuno Matos.

In the other match, a similar story, the North/South bidding being a bit less nerve wracking for North when in the open room South made an immediate Double of the 1♠ opening bid.....

Whenever I make a light take out double, my partner and I almost inevitably end up in no-trumps and go hurtling off so I am more inclined to pass these hands and come in later – on this occasion that would have been too late.
