Bridge At The Top

This year was the one in which I affirmed myself as a bridge professional. I had the privilege of competing with players who are among the best in the world. I got good results in some tournaments but the most important thing of all was the daily opportunities of sharing a table with the best players in the world.

I will talk about two hands which have affected me very much. On the first, my partner was Gabriel Chagas. We were defending 3NT in the knockout stage of the South American championship. My hand was ♠xxx ♥AKxx ♦Qxx ♣xxx The auction was 1♣-Pass-1♠-Pass-1NT-Pass-3NT-All Pass. (One Club was better minor).

Gabriel led the 8 of hearts, (attitude) and the dummy put down: ♠AQJx ♥xx ♦10xx ♣AQxx. I played king of hearts, ace of hearts and a heart. Right? ...

Wrong!

From this hand I learned that there are no automatic plays. What I knew about the hand was that declarer had three hearts headed by the QJ, and was easily going to make 8 tricks in the black suits. So the solution is in the diamonds. If declarer has ♠Kx(x) ♥QJx(x) ♦Hx(x) ♣Kxxx. We have to play diamonds

Which diamond to play?

If declarer has Kx then a small diamond works because we make three diamonds and two heart tricks. In this case partner has AJxxx in diamonds. Playing teams with ♥xxxx ♦AJxxx it seems mandatory to lead a diamond, so we have to exclude this hypothesis. It remains for us to analyse what we can do when the declarer has ♦Kxx. If you play small declarer plays small and we cannot open up the diamonds. If I play the queen, declarer plays the king and the suit is protected by the 10 third in dummy. However if I have ♦QJxx then declarer wins by withholding the ♦K, as it seems more likely that I am leading the queen with QJ than without the J.

In this specific case, declarer had ♠Kxx ♥QJxx ♦Kxx ♣Kxx. A simple and very elegant position but I could not find it in time, I played on autopilot after receiving the lead that I liked the most.

The second hand I want to talk about is from the final of the winter games in Monaco.

In the team captained by Juan Carlos Ventin in which, proudly, I play. Nystrom and I played

in the open room, facing the great Meckstroth and Zia. While in the closed room my teammates Wrang and Hult faced Brogeland and Lindqvist.

Wrang's hand was: ♠1043 ♥Q9875 ♦AKJ92 ♣—.

In a contested auction Wrang in first position Red v Green opened One Heart and the bidding went:

Lindqvist led the king of clubs and dummy put down:

The contract is ambitious, but seems to depend only on the diamond finesse. However, if something good happens in clubs, we can gather more information. Therefore, Wrang began by ruffing the ♣K in his hand, and Brogeland showed an odd number of clubs. He played a spade, which Brogeland took and returned a spade. Wrang ruffed the spade, carefully with the 10 of hearts in dummy. He played a diamond, North played the queen, and Wrang took the trick with the ace. At this time, if Wrang believes North's card play, North has a 4315, so he played a heart to the ace and everyone followed. Next came the ace of clubs, pitching a diamond from hand. Then a club ruffed where Lindqvist dropped the queen of clubs. Now, he ruffed the last spade with dummy's king of hearts, pitched the nine of diamonds on the ♣J and played the six of hearts towards the seven.

The end position was:

A hand very carefully played in which, at trick three, he had to ruff with the 10, leaving the six to get back to hand later.

I hope next year I will have more interesting hands to show you, and that my journey will be made of remarkable and didactic moments like these.

José Curado explains how to verify the deals using Hans Staveren's procedure.

In short, if someone wants to check that there is no hanky-panky going on with the procedure they should:

- 1 - Download the "present key" from <http://bit.ly/2018pKs> or click on link in footer menu on new website
- 2 - Check Euromillions lottery numbers (the "future key")
- 3 - Download the "past key" that will be published after the event (presumably in Bulletin 7)
- 4 - Run the program (download from <http://www.xs4all.nl/~sater/SquareDeal.zip>) using the 3-part key according to the instructions - the "present" and "past" files and insert the 5 numbers and 2 stars, as presented in the official results, comma separated, when prompted by the program.
- 5 - Compare the hands generated this way with the hands actually played.

CONFESSIONS OF AN EX-PAT

(Continuing my occasional series of frivolous observations, familiar to veterans of European Championships)

In January 1993 I walked into a travel agent's – a curiously old-fashioned idea a quarter of a century later – to try to find a cheap holiday in the sun. Rather to my surprise the cheapest on offer was Madeira. By a happy accident our hotel was a short stagger uphill from the Estádio dos Barreiros, so we went to the match and I began my career as a Marítimo fan (second string to Leicester City, of course).

By a less happy accident I'd picked the coldest week in Madeira for 42 years. This time I was not surprised: it was in keeping with my usual ill fortune in these matters (the only time I've been to Venice it was the coldest week in 30 years). The weather was still warm enough for shorts and a cardigan, though, and provided me with an aperçu into the wonder that is Madeira's climate. The bananas were ripening on the coast, yet 6 miles¹ away as the crow flies there was 6 foot² of snow on Pico do Arieiro. I fell in love.

(When I eventually bought a flat here, my geoclimatic jinx was true to form: the day before I was due to complete the purchase, I arrived at Gatwick to find utter pandemonium, no information, and no flights. It was the day of the Icelandic volcano – cheers, Sveinni.)

Anyway, here I am, happily retired, sitting on my balcony in the sun watching the cruise ships sail in and out of the port of Funchal. The winters have got longer and longer every year, as the thought of leaving this island idyll for Blighty³ grows increasingly unappealing. For the first few years I barely spoke to a Portuguese person, nor to any other person either, apart from people in shops and a couple I met at the football. It was just me and the cat and a lot of books. It was bliss. Then I ran into Miguel Teixeira at an EBL Seminar in Rome, he told José Júlio Curado about me, and I began a second Madeiran career as a bridge-player.

It's been a bit of a culture shock. Every time I play I remind myself that I need to buy ear-plugs. No one seems to know what the Stop card is for. I still don't understand 3rd & 5th leads, and Odds & Evens discards seem to me the worst method ever invented. But the players of the Madeira Bridge Association have been wonderful. Their kindness, and their tolerance of my appalling Portuguese (and inability to understand their Portuguese – or Madeirense, as some would insist) suggests a patience at odds with their impatience with their partners. I confess that from time to time I think fondly of the relative calm of a Wednesday night in Bridgend; but on the whole I'm grateful for being chivvied to join.

Less salutary has been the effect on my drinking habits. My friends in Britain know me as a non-drinker, but that's a thing of the past. No one has actually forced me to quaff glass after glass of delicious vinho tinto, nor to order an amêndoa amarga after dinner, nor to drink one too many margaritas (never again); but somehow the habit has crept up on me. I have also enjoyed not feeling like a pariah, since almost everyone here seemed to smoke; I returned from my summer in Britain to find that everyone has taken up vaping instead. O tempora, O mores.

For some reason, until last year my only previous visit to the Madeira International had been in 2006. My friend Gilly and I stayed in the very same hotel, a short stagger above the stadium and a rather long stagger uphill from the Vidamar, and teamed up with two Latvians, one of them very nice. We enjoyed a brief moment in the lead when we won all three matches in a session, but it didn't last. Looking back over the bulletins, I note that we beat the team of Lara, Capucho, Pereira and Palma – the winners of the tournament - 30-16, which must rank as one of the more glorious moments of my bridge career. Other notable scalps included the Van Helsing German-Austrian team, from whom we took 31

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IMPs in two boards, and some Portuguese players whose company I've been lucky enough to enjoy in recent times, such as Jorge Cruzeiro and Ricardo Fernandes. I seem to have avoided most of my Madeiran friends, who were playing under such cryptic team names as Topozero, Snapper (not so cryptic), The International Set, Remontada and La Stefan (I'm sure there must be an explanation).

From now on I mean to play in every Madeira International until I can no longer hold a hand

or see the cards. I can walk (downhill) to the venue from my flat and catch a bus (uphill) back, so I've no excuse. It appears that Portugal is not going to chuck me out despite the strange decision of my native land to cut itself off from the rest of Europe. And I am not an ex-pat, I'm an immigrant, just as the other 48,999 British people living in Portugal are immigrants, not to mention the 310,000 in Spain. I want to learn the language and to live as the Madeirans live. But I can't give up the Marmite.

Options for Friday Excursions

Option A East of Madeira

Coach leaves Vidamar 9.45. Lunch included

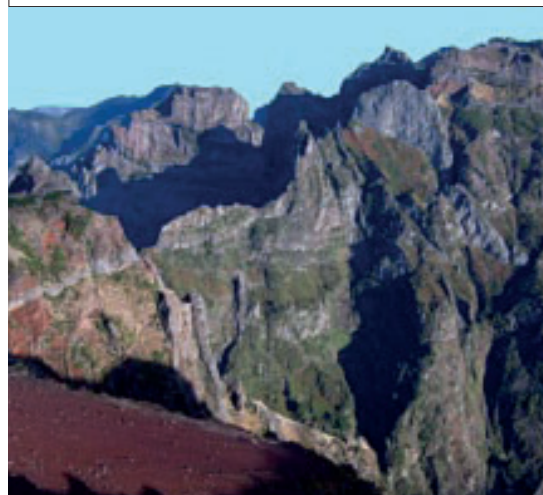
Explore the eastern side of the island, with its breath-taking views, enchanting laurisilva (laurel forest) and traditional villages. A stop at the Ponta do Garajau viewpoint (statue of Christ the King, magnificent view over the Atlantic) is followed by a scenic drive through the laurisilva to Poiso and Pico do Areeiro, the third-highest peak in Madeira, 1818 m above sea-level. There are spectacular views from the road up to the mountain; in good weather you can see cotton-wool clouds hanging in the valleys below. The tour continues through the forest to Ribeiro Frio, a nature park with trout hatchery. On the way to Santana you will be able to admire the rich green of the terraced fields. Lunch in Santana, a beautiful village on the north coast, with its famous triangular thatched houses. The route back to the hotel passes through Machico, the first landfall of Zarco and Tristão Vaz Teixeira when Madeira was discovered in 1419. Time of return to hotel to be confirmed.



Option B Catamaran Trip (3 Hours)

Coach leaves Vidamar 9.30

A relaxing trip along the south coast of Madeira, with a good chance of spotting whales and dolphins in all their magnificence and in their natural habitat.



Option C Jeep Trip (4 Hours, Min 8 persons)

Coach leaves Vidamar 10.00

The tour stops first at the Miranda viewpoint, with superb views over the Bay of Funchal, and continues to Vale do Paraíso (Paradise Valley), with optional 20-minute break. The route then climbs to Pico do Arieiro (1818m), the third-highest peak on the island and the most visited. The next stop is Santo da Serra, followed by Portela, where from the viewpoint Porto da Cruz and Faial can be seen. The excursion ends with visits to Fonduras and then Machico. Drop-off at your hotel.

What to write about the Warm Up Pairs?

The brilliant English journalist David Bird is renowned for his dislike of low level contracts, especially 1NT. Whilst these can be very important in a Pairs event they are not the type of deals that are designed to entertain the reader.

So, I make no apologies for selecting deals where more than seven tricks were required.

This was our last deal of the event and I survived the dreadful decision to open 1♠. The key bid was Ron Tacchi's decision to go past 5♥. He reasoned that missing the ♠K and those important trumps that East would not have bid 5♣ without a diamond control.

There was nothing to the play, and +1430 was worth 91.8/10.2

North's double of 2♣ was intended as Stayman and the jump to 3♥ showed five spades and four hearts. West led the ♣8 and declarer won with the nine and played a spade. When West discarded a club declarer went up with dummy's king and played the ♠J, covered by the queen and ace as West pitched the ♦2. Declarer continued with the ♣J and West won and tried a diamond. Declarer won with the ten and played the ♥4, putting up dummy's queen when West followed with the nine. Declarer cashed the ♠10 and when West parted with a club declarer came to hand with a heart and cashed three club tricks. On the last of these West pitched a diamond, so declarer also took the last two tricks for twelve in all and 92-10; +660 would have produced exactly the same score.

North led a spade and declarer went up with dummy's ace and played three rounds of diamonds, ruffing in dummy, followed by the ♠Q. They were the only pair to bid 6♠ so their reward was 0-102 (or should that be our reward?).

I confess it did not occur to me to pass West's 1♦ - it happened once where Halldór Thorvaldsson & Hulda Hjalmarisdóttir were N/S and it gave them 60-42. I did consider bidding 3♠, but I doubt it would have prevented E/W reaching game. I am willing to confess that if I had held West's cards I would not have been able to resist bidding 6♣ which would have been worth 96 match-points. The more modest 5♣+1 still collected 76.

However, Johan Sylvan produced the king of spades and returned a spade to the ace. Fredin cashed the ace of diamonds and played another diamond for a quick down one.

After a similar bidding sequence Ola Rimstedt led a trump. Declarer, Bart Nab, won in hand and advanced the jack of clubs, covered by the queen: 420.

At the third table four hearts was played by North. Joris van Lankveld led a diamond to the ace. Berend van den Bos returned a club and declarer, Frederic Wrang, let it ride to the jack. After that he claimed ten tricks.

Fredin led the seven of clubs and declarer, Simon de Wijs, had eleven tricks: minus 400.

At the other two tables the contract was four clubs, declared by North. Joris van Lankveld led a small spade: minus 150. Mikael Rimstedt found the lead of the king of spades and the heart switch: minus 130.
