200 Barrier Broken



A new record as the Open Pairs event has finally broken the 200 barrier when 207 pairs sat down to start off The 21st Madeira International Bridge Open Pairs event. After the first of three sessions **Erik Eriksen** and **Finn Fyllingslid** from Norway are leading the tournament with 67.58%, in second place are **Andrei Kavalenka** and **Ihar Radziukevich** from Belarus who have a score of 64.85. In third are the first Portuguese pair **Jorge Cruzeiro** and **Reinaldo Timóteo** on 64.83%.

Following the Law

The International Bridge Press Association's annual awards ceremony which takes place in October in Sanya, China, now vies with the Oscars as one of the glitziest events of the year: http://www.jannersten.org:1500/~server/IBPA/archive/Awards/2018_IBPA_Awards_HBF_Sanya_%20Hi-Res.pdf

Bridge journalists around the world are busy typing until their fingers bleed in the hope of being nominated for and then winning one of the coveted awards thereby earning an all expenses paid trip to Sanya in 2019. One of the categories is for the Best Bid Hand of the Year.

Most people are familiar with the concept of the Law of Total Tricks - *The total number of tricks available on a deal is equal to the total number of trumps each partnership holds in their best suits, being the sum of the number of tricks available to each side if they could choose trumps.*

Although he did not invent it, it was popularised by the brilliant American writer and player, Larry Cohen in two books, *The Law of Total Tricks* and *Following the Law*.

This deal from the Warm Up Pairs in Madeira saw one pair applying The Law in spectacular style:

Bridge the Old Way

Before the advent of BBO, Funbridge and Our Game, reporting on bridge meant watching at the table - not too difficult unless you play with screens, when it can sometimes be difficult to follow the play. In those pre-computer days scoring a big event took a fair amount of time, but the advent of computers and Bridgемate changed all that. However, nothing is infallible and if something goes wrong then one has to resort to the old ways. The first session of the Pairs Championship saw the Bridgемates go on strike and at one point I began to wonder if I might have to go in search of some travelling score sheets.

I decided to follow the fortunes of my old friend Carlos Luiz and his partner Nuno Paz.

South led the ♠2 and declarer won with dummy's eight and played the king of clubs. South won and played a second spade and that allowed declarer to win in dummy, come to hand with a club and play a diamond to the queen. When that held, declarer played a spade to the ace followed by the winning clubs and was assured of ten tricks, only 18/186 for N/S.

The way to hold declarer to nine tricks is for South to return a club or play the ♦J. In either case if declarer wins and plays a spade South takes the king and now switches to a heart, putting the defenders one step ahead, but -140 would only collect 45/159.

East led the ♦10 and declarer won and played a club to the king. When it held he cashed the top hearts before playing a second club, so he lost three tricks and scored 135/69. Taking the heart finesse delivers the overtrick and 183/21.

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East led the ♥4 and declarer won in dummy and ran the ♠Q. When East won and played a second trump declarer had an easy route to ten tricks, as he could pitch his losing diamonds on dummy's spades.

Clearly a diamond switch is needed, but how can East work that out?

Well, if West follows to the first round of spades with the nine it might operate as an alarm clock, suggesting West has something useful in diamonds.

+170 was worth 133/71, while +140 collects only 92/112.

North led the ♣Q, so the defenders took a trick.

Easy to see that East should have done something over 4♥ - maybe ask for key cards and then settle for 6NT?

Losing only 480 gave N/S 195-9, but even if E/W had bid 6♥ N/S would have collected 125-79.

One pair made 7NT, but it was 2 points short of a complete top, that going to the pair who made 7♥ doubled when North led a diamond.

There is an auction that screams for a spade lead. However, East preferred the ♣J and now declarer can take all the tricks by playing for everything to break, simply ruffing a diamond in hand. Still sleepy (his own words!) declarer drew trumps, apparently settling for twelve tricks, but West decided to discard the ♠AK!

N/S racked up 195-9 - had East led a spade their score would have been only 40-164.

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Bidding a direct 3NT over a Multi with this type of hand is not recommended - its better to reserve it for hands with a running minor and major suit stoppers. Its better to start with a double, generally played as 13-15 balanced or any 19+.

All one can add is that N/S scored 156-48. Losing 1020 was worth 88-116 while the 25 pairs who reached 7NT collected 24-180.

South led the ♣K and when it held he continued with the seven, North taking the ace and switching to the ♠4. When declarer put up the king South won, cashed the ♣Q and then played a spade, North winning with the queen and playing the ♠10. Declarer pitched a diamond from his hand, ruffed in dummy and cashed the ♥K - one down but only 45-159 for N/S.

Do you think N/S should have got into the auction?

I am not a fan of overcalling at the two level on a five-card suit, but those clubs are chunky and if South bids 2♣ North can then introduce the spades over West's 2♥.

After South's initial pass it looks bit rich for North to bid 2♠ over 2♥, but South might have done something, despite the singleton diamond. If you are prepared to bid 3♠ over 3♦ you can double 2♥, but otherwise you might bid 3♣, which surely suggest you have clubs and spades, given that you did not overcall 2♣ in the first place.

A steady performance saw the boys score 56.73% which left them in 40th place.

West leads the seven of spades. You win in dummy and play a small club to the queen,

which holds. The king of clubs appears to be onside but against shrewd opponents you cannot be certain. So you cross to dummy in hearts and repeat the club finesse, which wins. You now have eight tricks outside the diamond suit. If you manage to make four diamond tricks, you are home even if the king of clubs is still guarded. How do you tackle the diamond suit?

The Brazilian International

For the first round of the Pairs I chose to sit behind Diego Brenner, the Brazilian international, who was partnering the organiser Miguel Teixeira. With the troubles of the airport yesterday Diego had had problems resulting in probably too little sleep before arriving at the hotel and straight away sitting down at the bridge table.

The action at this table did not get the pulse racing with fifty per cent of the boards scoring within 10% of average. In general nobody made any great errors or brilliancies. We will commence with their fifth deal.

The board was already won after this auction as Three Hearts failing by one trick was worth 76% of the match-points. The majority of the room could not open the South hand in no-trumps and so E/W had a better chance of getting into the fray with their spade suit and two thirds managed to play a spade contract.

In the play E/W did not cash their three club tricks and after declarer had taken the right view in the diamond suit the defence went awry on its discards and allowed declarer an extra diamond trick and 96% of the match-points.

After the lead of the ace of diamonds and continuation, which declarer ruffed in hand, he played a small club towards dummy. Perforce this was taken by West who now fell from grace by continuing with another club. This allowed declarer to ruff a club in dummy and set up the queen of diamonds by ruffing out the king. Of course with the line declarer took West can beat the contract by switching to the jack of hearts. So was declarer always doomed as he could not possibly lose a club to East? No, is the answer, counter-intuitively he can succeed by playing a small heart from his hand at trick three or crossing to dummy with a trump to ruff out the king of diamonds which will allow him to discard a losing heart on the established queen. When you lead a heart the defence can cash three tricks in the suit but then that establishes the thirteenth heart in dummy and that along with the queen of diamonds allows you to discard both losing clubs. To be sure of beating the contract the defence must lead a black card at the first or second trick. Succeeding in his contract gave declarer 91%.

After North had responded Two Hearts I had already written in Four Hearts as South's subsequent bid as I suspected South had heard of Meckstroth's law (if partner freely supports your six-card major, bid game) but he contented himself with a simple raise to the three level. West was not to be denied and bid his six-card minor where the matter rested. North led a small heart taken by South with his ace and he promptly switched to his singleton diamond taken in dummy. A small trump from was the next card to hit the green baize. Whereupon South went into the tank. We, as spectators and privy to all

four hands know he must rise with the ace and put his partner in with a spade to get his diamond ruff. After much internal debate South elected to duck and so now the contract came home. Had North played the ten of diamonds rather than a smaller one it might have made South's decision easier. Whilst making Four Hearts requires an excellent guess in the trump suit to succeed, it is likely that West would bid Five Clubs and after a double, defending that would result in a much better result, but only 17% for letting the contract through.

After eleven rounds I retired to my office to deal with some matters as Board 13 was placed on the table. Of course the opposition played in Four Spades doubled and failed by five tricks for a score of -1400.

At the end of the day Miguel and Diego finished with 50.98% placing them just in the top half. They will need two very good sessions to get to the top of the leader board but there is still a lot for which to play.

Declarer wins in dummy and finesses in clubs. He crosses in hearts and repeats the club finesse. So far so good. Four diamond tricks will see you home. Both Peter Fredin and Joris van Lankveld (who was in 6♦ continued (in trick 3) with a small diamond to the ace, catering for the bare king of diamonds offside (or onside). Both went one down. Tim Verbeek took the percentage play of advancing the queen of diamonds, catering for the bare eight, nine or ten of diamonds with East. West covered and after winning with the ace of diamonds Verbeek played a diamond to the six. West won the diamond ten and declarer claimed on the diamond finesse for a splendid plus 990.
